# Introduction

Every year the Victorian Fisheries Authority, stocks many of Victoria's inland lakes, impoundments and rivers with key recreational angling species to improve fishing opportunities for fishers across the state. The annual rounds of Vic Fish Stock regional consultative meetings plan the direction of these stocked fisheries. This document reports on the outcomes of the 2023 consultative meetings.

The fish stocking year runs from April 1<sup>st</sup> each year through to March 31<sup>st</sup> of the following year.

## **Vic Fish Stock meetings**

The Vic Fish stock meetings consider recreational angling for each waterbody to:

- Determine the management objectives for the fishery
- Review the fishery in light of the current year's stocking plan and identify any modifications required
- Draft the following year's stocking plan
- Identify other opportunities relevant to fish stocking
- Identify current fishery management opportunities
- Assess additional proposals to the stocking program

The Vic Fish Stock meetings provide a forum for discussions on fish stocking regimes and related recreational fisheries management opportunities.

In 2023, three meetings were held on-line in May following the draft stocking plan being released for public comment for a period of five weeks.

Submissions to change the stocking program are tabled from representative angler groups and from the VFA. This ensures that the submissions are supported by the relevant groups. Individuals who wish to submit changes are encouraged to contact the representation groups.

The meetings involve invited representatives from a range of stakeholder groups and include the Victorian Fisheries Authority, the Victorian Recreational Fishing peak body (VRFish), Women in Recreational Fishing and Boating (WIRFAB) network, Australian Trout Foundation (ATF), Native Fish Australia (NFA) and fishing association representatives.

The Authority acknowledges and values the important contribution made by stakeholders in this process, particularly those who volunteered their time to prepare for and attend these meetings.

## 2022-23 Fish stocking season—Summary

The 2022 Vic Fish Stock proposed that 1,334,090 salmonids and 8,790,500 native fish could be stocked. A total of 1,255,647 salmonids and 6,760,200 natives were stocked.

The 2022 fish production year was impacted due to the statewide floods that occurred in the spring of 2022. This impacted the availability and condition of mature golden perch broodstock and combined with production challenges at our hatcheries (and in NSW), resulted in lower than planned production numbers.

## 2023-24 Vic Fish Stock meeting outcomes

The 2023-24 Vic Fish Stock meetings proposed native fish to be stocked into Victorian public waters in the summer of 2023-24 and salmonids stocked over winter 2023. Details of the planned species and numbers to be stocked for each water body are detailed in Appendix 1.

The proposed fish release figures summarised here and listed in Appendix 1 are targets only. Numbers may vary and may be exceeded, or not attained, depending on hatchery conditions, water conditions (e.g., water quality, water levels), infrastructure maintenance, decisions of waterway managers, security of fish supply (e.g., unforeseen impacts on production such as mortality, disease, quarantine status and availability of required stocks from private suppliers) and any unforeseen circumstances that could preclude planned fish releases. Fish allocations may, therefore, be amended prior to release.

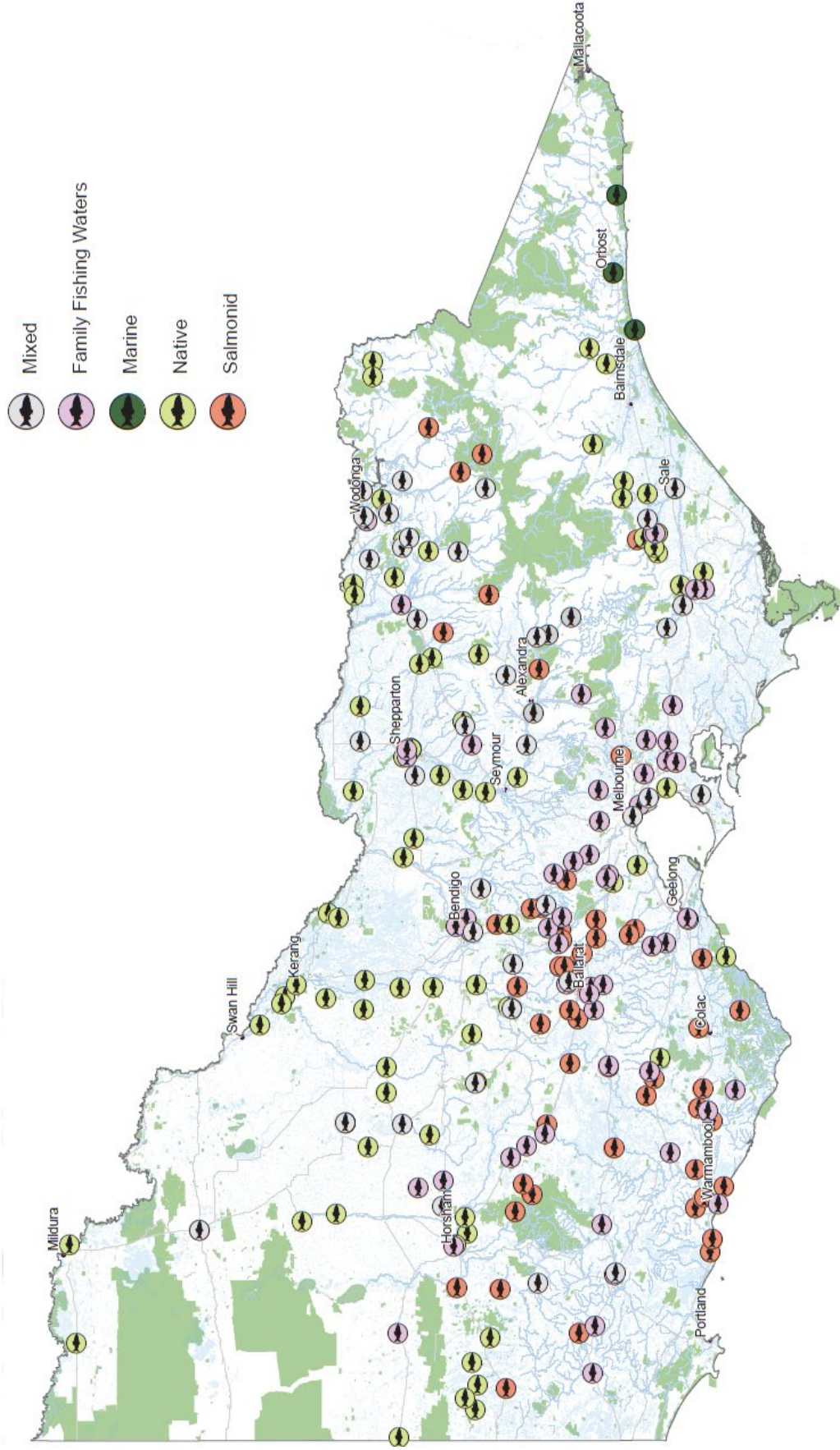

# Fish Stocking in Victoria





# Victorian Fisheries Authority Activity Spotlight

The Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) is always looking to provide or improve recreational angling opportunities across the state. Here is a glimpse of some of the VFA's activities pertaining to stocking and inland fisheries from last year.

## Brighter future for Gippsland Lakes

Dusky flathead are one of Victoria's most prized recreational species and we've stocked a record number of fingerlings to boost their population in Gippsland.

The last of 46,100 dusky flathead have now been released into the Gippsland Lakes at Kalimna and Lakes Entrance with help from members of the Gunaikurnai Land and Waters Aboriginal Corporation, complementing the 82,000 stocked in the previous two years (2021 & 2022).

The Bemm River was also stocked with 5,000 dusky flathead fingerlings, matching the stocking received in 2021. A total of 138,100 fingerlings have now stocked in the Gippsland area.

The stocking trial is a key part of the VFA's Gippsland Lakes Recreational Fishery Plan to return the iconic waterway to a fishing mecca for recreational anglers. The VFA acknowledges the support received from Gunaikurnai Land and Waters Aboriginal Cooperation, Mallacoota and District Angling Clubs, Loch Sport Fishing Association and the Bairnsdale RSL Angling club for this program.



The Government is investing a further \$96m to continue to improve fishing, boating, piers and aquaculture. This includes \$2.5m in habitat improvements to preserve marine, estuarine and freshwater fisheries, and support Victoria's first indigenous-run oyster farm – with a \$250,000 grant for the farm in Lakes Entrance, also being led by the Gunaikurnai Land and Waters Aboriginal Corporation.



## Arcadia Stage 1 completed as production ramps up

Since our update in last year's Vic Fish Stock, our wonderful native fish farm at Arcadia has moved ahead in strides. The steel hatchery building is now complete with a multi-level concrete slab, recessed mechanical services area, internal walls and ceilings and hundreds of tanks and troughs of all sizes all plumbed in and operating.

Our talented crew at Arcadia have applied their design and trade skills to good effect by doing most of the internal plumbing fit out. All pipework is laid into drainage pits to keep the floor free of tripping hazards and water. Both bore water and re-use water supplies are delivered to the hatchery via extensive underground plumbing and two huge receiving water supply tanks.

A state-of-the-art alarm monitoring system has been installed and rotating drum screen filters and biological filters are now fully operational. Heater chiller units are operating to carefully manage water temperature in the hatchery. The hatchery building is holding around 80 impressive mature golden perch (2 to 5 kg) which are being hand fed on thawed shrimp and small carp (caught locally).

Moving outside the hatchery, all 12 brood ponds are now fully loaded and home to more than 200 thumping Murray cod and golden perch. These fish will be the primary source of broodfish for breeding native fish this summer at Arcadia.

Our 20 plankton ponds have performed well at Arcadia with 500,000 native fish fry ongrown to fingerling stage in just the first few months of production. In the second season of operation, we produced around 800,000 native fish which was only limited by the shortage in the supply of native fish fry from other hatcheries.

Major flooding across the Murray Darling basin in summer disrupted the condition and breeding of golden perch and hatchery access to running ripe fish from the wild. At the peak of this flood, the worst for almost 100 years, access to our Arcadia property was cut off by the flooding of Castle Creek however, all production areas and building infrastructure were not inundated. The production areas of our property are located well above the 1:100 year floodplain which was a key criteria for site selection before the property was purchased. Our native fish farming guru Stephen Vidler was marooned on the property throughout the flood and reported that large numbers of kangaroo, wombats and snakes found sanctuary on the higher parts of our property. Now that we have our full complement of mature broodfish, production is set to significantly increase at Arcadia this season.

Works have also started on the construction of a Visitors Centre at the front of the property which is expected to be completed in 2024. The Visitors Centre will attract people from far and wide with its picnic facilities, interpretive signage, well-stocked fish out pond and creative children's playground – which have all been designed to celebrate the amazing cultural, social, and economic contribution that native fish have made to our lives in the past and present. It will be a great place for families to enjoy a day out. We are planning an open day event for the hatchery and Visitors Centre at Arcadia in early 2024 (the date to be announced).





Based on the early success of the hatchery, in 2022 the State Government announced a further \$10 million dollars in funding to triple the native fish production at Arcadia. This will increase the number of brood ponds, plankton ponds and water re-use ponds from 33 (currently) to 105 in total. At full production, Arcadia is expected to produce more than 6 million Murray cod, golden perch, silver perch and catfish each year. This will make it one of the largest native fish farms of its kind in Australia and will safeguard the supply of native fish well into the future. We are in the planning stages of this exciting expansion with works expected to commence in late 2024.

The Arcadia journey has been exciting, complex and not without its challenges, but this investment is now bearing fruit, and with additional funding, it will become one of our most profound investments to recover and rebuild our native fish and improve recreational fishing for every fisher.



## Recovering our Macquarie perch

The VFA have secured a \$3.7M collaborative research project to help recover this iconic native fish – *Cracking the Code*. The project will focus on four key elements:

- Nutrition and breeding optimisation
- Hormone optimisation
- Development of a Macquarie Perch captive breeding hatchery manual, and
- Broodstock collection, genetics, monitoring and evaluation.

Key project partners include the Fisheries Research Development Corporation (FRDC), NSW Fisheries, Victorian recreational fishers, NSW recreational fishers, Deakin University, the Norwegian Institute of Aquaculture Research, University of Melbourne, University of the Sunshine Coast, Monash University, the North East and Goulburn Broken Catchment Management Authorities and the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA).

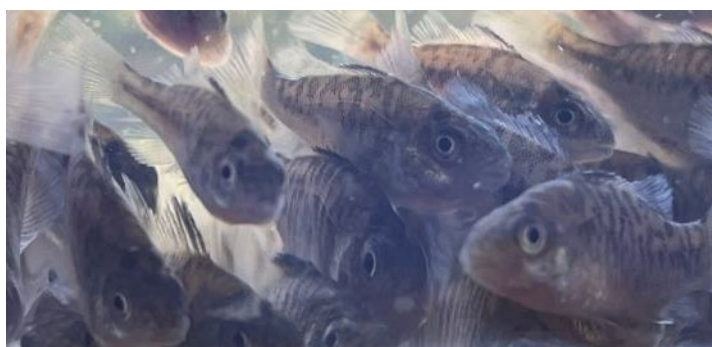
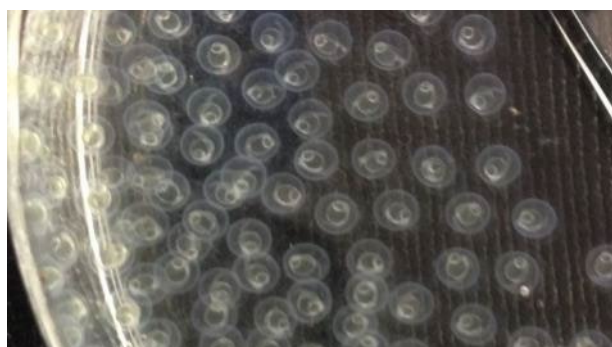
Together with the \$5 million investment committed to upgrade Snobs Creek infrastructure, we aim to be producing over 500,000 Macquarie perch annually to re-establish populations, and again make them one of the most abundant recreational native fish species in upland Murray Darling Basin streams. This funding will work in tandem with Commonwealth funding to improve (modernise) facilities at Snobs Creek. We aim to construct more breeding ponds and build a dedicated fish holding facility to assist producing large numbers of Macquarie perch, trout cod and small bodied natives to re-establish into wild populations.

More than 185,000 fingerlings had been stocked since the start of 2022, including 40,000 this year. Stockings have been complemented by instream fish habitat and riverbank improvement works conducted by locals, the DEECA, Landcare volunteers, recreational fishers, and traditional owner groups.

The VFA has also worked with SEA LIFE Melbourne Aquarium to officially open the new Macquarie perch display – which is aimed at raising awareness of the captive breeding research required to re-establish the species in the Murray Darling Basin.

## Crater Lakes success

For 95 years the Lake Purrumbete and Camperdown angling clubs have helped us stock fish into the south-west's Crater Lakes.

Since 1928 volunteer efforts have seen Purrumbete and Bullen Merri maintain their status as premier fisheries, because of the care club volunteers take to help us stock many truckloads of fish a year.

To support these ongoing and dedicated efforts, we have supplied them with purpose-built nets, large tubs, and buckets, to ensure the careful release of fish into the best habitats within the lakes.

The equipment is part of a trial to see if we can get even better outcomes from fish stocking at the Crater Lakes which receive brown trout, rainbow trout, tiger trout and Chinook salmon annually to create a uniquely diverse year-round mixed fishery.

Oh, and let's not forget the sizable reddies that Purrumbete is famous for or those allusive big bass in Bullen Merri which turn up in winter when you least expect it!





## VFA supporting volunteers and recreational fishing around Ballarat

Early in June 2023 VFA Staff members joined volunteers from the Ballarat Fish Acclimatisation Society (BFAS) at Lake Wendouree, in their collection of brown trout for breeding at the Ballarat Fish Hatchery.

Over 300 mature brown trout were gently collected using a seine net at the hatchery outfall pipe, where they are carefully stripped of eggs and milt then safely returned to the lake.

The eggs and milt were mixed, fertilised and taken to the hatchery to produce thousands of fingerling trout, which will be stocked back into Lake Wendouree and other Victorian waters for recreational fishers to enjoy.

This trout breeding and production practise at the Ballarat Hatchery has been conducted by volunteers since 1870 – yep, that’s an incredible 153 years of cultural heritage and service to recreational fishing!

Recreational fishers and the VFA have supported the BFAS Ballarat Hatchery operations this year by introducing the 200m hatchery outfall pipe exclusion area throughout June and July, while the Ballarat volunteers complete this valuable trout breeding.



## World class collaboration for Murray cod and recreational fishing benefits

Late last year, the VFA and partner agencies launched an online survey aimed at Murray cod anglers to better understand how they catch and release Murray cod, and how we can improve the Care for Cod campaign.

The survey has now been completed by 4,500 anglers – the largest survey of cod fishers to date. The work was led by the VFA in association with Andy and Sascha Danylchuk (US recreational fisheries experts from Keep Fish Wet), Steven J Cooke (considered the number 1 recreational fisheries expert worldwide), Meaghan Guckian (a US based recreational fisheries social scientist), VRFish, WIRFAB and the Murray cod Fisher Reference Group.



Preliminary results include:

- Satisfaction with Murray cod fishing in Victoria is high (68%)
- Murray cod fishers believe Murray cod fishing has improved considerably since the 70's
- The primary motivations for most fishers to go Murray cod fishing are for non-catch related health and well-being benefits such as 'to be outdoors', 'to relax' and 'to be with friends and family'
- Catch and release remains high in Murray cod fishing, but harvest is still important to some fishers
- Murray cod handling is considered important and is improving amongst cod fishers
- Livescope / forward facing sonar use is increasing amongst cod fishers (13% of respondents)
- Murray cod fishers have concerns about blackwater and carp
- The Care for Cod Campaign is making a difference with high fisher awareness, influence on fisher handling practices and fishers are sharing improvements with others

## Fish rescues across our state

Field teams of staff from CMA's, DEECA, NSW Fisheries, OzFish Unlimited and the VFA have been saving fish in response to environmental challenges (low dissolved oxygen) across the state. The rapid and co-ordinated response by various agencies helped to ensure native fish and crays from Gunbower Creek, Pyramid Creek, Taylor's Creek, Racecourse Lake, Phyland Lagoon and the Murray River (Echuca to Mildura) avoided death.

Almost 2,000 native fish and Murray spiny freshwater crayfish have been relocated, including many large Murray cod to 120cm. Over 1,000 native fish and crayfish were held in Government and private hatcheries in Victoria and NSW, under the watchful eye of hatchery staff while they recover.

At Snobs Creek, the team received and cared for highly endangered purple spotted gudgeon and tandanus catfish. At Arcadia, the team cared for Murray cod, golden perch, silver perch and Murray spiny freshwater Crayfish.





## Stocking of native fish to assist flood/blackwater recovery

In Spring 2022, many Victorian waterways suffered devastating native fish kills due to flooding and blackwater impacts.

The VFA have been working closely with the Catchment Management Authorities, environmental managers, VRFish, angling associations and local independent rec fishers to monitor the systems and we understand water quality is now sufficient for native fish restocking.

Through consultation with key stakeholders, 200,000 Murray cod and golden perch fingerlings will be reallocated (stocked) into flood affected waters across the Goulburn Broken and North Central catchments including:

- Broken Creek
- Little Murray River
- Pyramid Creek
- Loddon River
- Broken River
- Gunbower Creek
- Boosey Creek

These fish are in addition to the numbers of native fish those waters were planning to receive this summer.

In addition to the reallocation of native fish stocking:

- 2,000 Macquarie perch was stocked into Hughes Creek (for the first time), to build resilience and improve genetics in this important population following flood impacts
- Some of our blackwater salvaged fish that were temporarily housed at Arcadia have been returned to the Gunbower system with recreational fishers and indigenous groups.





## Devilbend hotspot

Devilbend Reservoir on the Mornington Peninsula has received its first fish stocking of 2023 with the release of catchable size brown trout (500g) as part of the Victorian Government's ongoing plan to improve fishing. Devilbend Reservoir is already a terrific fishery thanks to the stocking of nearly 250,000 brown trout and rainbow trout since 2010 when stocking first commenced. Some of these fish have grown to 2kg or more and are highly prized by local anglers and visitors.

The stocking of Devilbend has created a tourism drawcard on the Mornington Peninsula with visitors now provided with great freshwater fishing in addition to all of the saltwater fishing opportunities.

In addition to trout, Devilbend Reservoir is also one of many waterways in Victoria stocked with estuary perch and has received more than 120,000 over the past eight years. They have excelled in the productive waters and are keenly sought after by lure casters and fly fishers on warm summer nights when they are highly active.





## Barkers Creek fish habitat installation

Fishing opportunities continue to improve at Barkers Creek Reservoir with the addition of 27 logs and root balls to create more fish habitat. This along with the allowance for non-powered watercraft will only improve your chances at this amazing waterway.

The VFA have stocked over 170,000 golden perch and Murray cod in there over the last 5 years and they'll love the new homes created by this timber, which was salvaged from storm recovery efforts in the Macedon Ranges.

Most of the snags have been positioned within casting distance of the shore so everyone benefits, whether you're in a kayak, a tinnie with an electric motor, or just tossing a line in from the bank.

These habitat investment initiatives complement the previous fish habitat already installed into the reservoir back in 2020.

It's another great project, with support from Coliban Water that'll make the most of this little mixed fishery in central Victoria that's home to trout, golden perch, Murray cod and redfin.

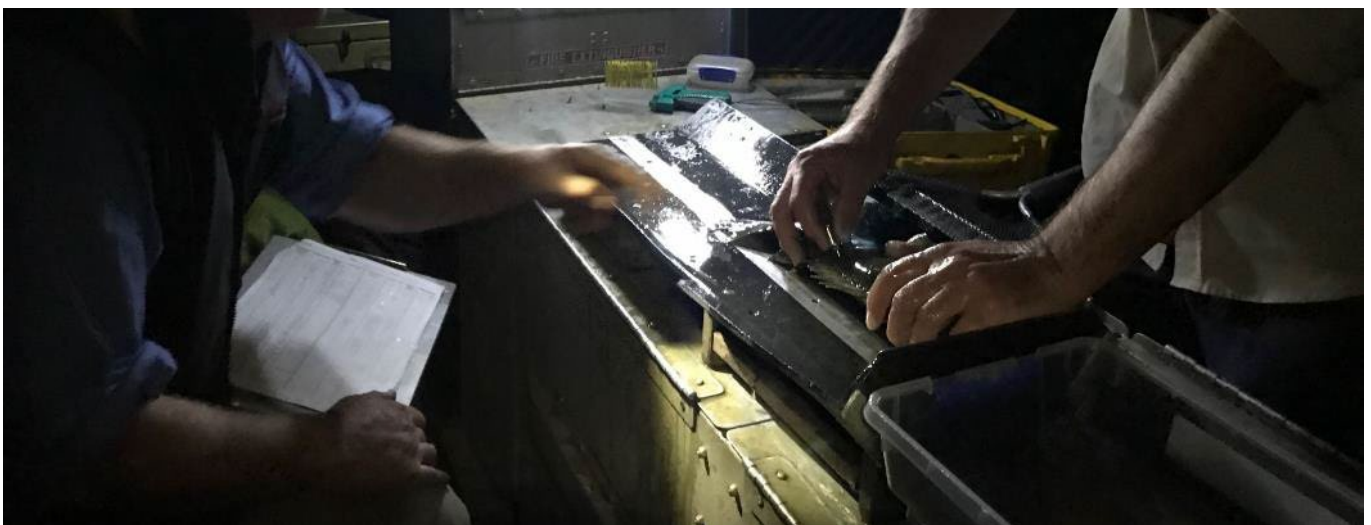
## Native Fish Report Cards continue

The Native Fish Report Card program was approved for funding of \$135,000 from the VFA and the RFL Trust Account, which will provide two more years of monitoring for our key recreational native fish species and iconic waterways. The program is funded until 2024.

The funding contributes to the collaborative program with anglers and the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA) - The Arthur Rylah Institute to produce health report cards for six of our most popular and valued native fish species across five priority Victorian rivers. Report cards are produced for populations of Murray cod, trout cod, Macquarie perch, silver perch, golden perch and Australian bass. The program provides unprecedented information to monitor native fish population health, track fisheries performance and assess the effectiveness of fisheries management interventions, such as fish stocking, regulations, and habitat restoration.

## World Recreational Fishing Conference 2023

The Victorian Government secured the hosting rights for the 10th World Recreational Fishing Conference in 2023 and hosted the event from February 18-23, at the Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre.

The Andrews Labor Government secured hosting rights with a bid led by the Victorian Fisheries Authority in partnership with the Fisheries Research and Development Corporation and recreational fishing bodies including VRFish, FutureFish Foundation and Women in Recreational Fishing Network.

The conference was attended by almost 350 recreational fisheries managers, scientists and academics from across Australia and beyond including Mongolia, Belize, Belgium, Italy and The Bahamas to share the latest trends, research and industry insights.

International speakers included Keep Fish Wet executive director Sascha Clark Danylchuk and Trout Unlimited's Steve Moyer from the USA, Norwegian fisheries researcher Keno Ferter, South African scientist Christopher Bova and UK actor and host of the Extreme Fishing TV series Robson Green.

Australia's wealth of recreational fishing knowledge is also being tapped into through Stan Lui, whose keynote address delved into First nations peoples and their interactions with recreational fisheries, as well as OzFish Unlimited founder Craig Copeland and recreational fisheries scientist Dr Matt Taylor.

The Conference followed the Ultimate Fishing Expo held over the weekend prior, which brought together fishers from across the state to see the latest gear from more than 50 exhibitors as well as hearing tips and tricks from a range of presenters including international fly-fishing expert April Vokey and VFA ambassadors Bachar Houli and Lee Rayner.

Victoria was the ideal location to host the conference as its home to Australia's best recreational fishing, from snapper, whiting and calamari in Port Phillip Bay to catches of southern bluefin tuna and kingfish along the coast, wild trout in high country streams and the iconic Murray cod throughout northern waters.

## More rainbow trout stocked across Melbourne

Rainbow trout formed part of our ever-growing stocking efforts across Victoria over the past few years.

Rainbow trout are a great stocking option for beginners because they're easy to catch and take a variety of baits and lures. With the increased efforts for metro stockings, Melbournians will not need to travel far to enjoy these wonderful opportunities.

The average size of these trout are approximately 200 – 250g, which is an ideal catchable size for beginners. In addition, towards the trout opening season, a special stocking of 'stonker' trout – broodstock sized (2-4kg) occurs to provide increased opportunities to land the 'big one'.

The stockings have been funded by recreational fishing licence fees and form part of the State Government's \$96 million Go Fishing Victoria plan to get more people fishing, more often.

## New horizons for stocked bass and perch fisheries

The Victorian Government has delivered for recreational fishers by stocking more than 560,000 Australian bass and estuary perch into nearly 30 lakes and rivers, including seven waterways for the first time.

The bass and perch stockings are part of the Victorian Fisheries Authority's statewide program, supported by recreational fishing licence fees.

Some waters were unable to be stocked this year due to unseasonably high flows impacting small fish survival. These include the Barwon River in Geelong that was scheduled to receive 100,000 estuary perch and the Latrobe River in Gippsland was due for 20,000 Australian bass.

Stocking of bass and estuary perch will continue in Spring 2023. Heyfield Racecourse Lake in Gippsland was stocked with 2,000 Australian bass for the first time, as was Lake Elingamite near Cobden in the state's south-west, which received 5,000 fingerlings. They are two of 19 waterways to share in 319,000 Australian bass.

Once the bass fingerlings grow to catchable size in three to four years, they will provide a summertime fishery to complement regular trout stockings in both waters during the cooler months.

Five new waters welcomed estuary perch this season, with the Little River receiving 5,000 fingerlings, Lagers Cutting at Point Lonsdale 15,000, Upper Stony Creek Reservoir 30,000, Painkalac Reservoir 10,000 and Rocklands Reservoir near the Grampians 26,000.

## Lake Toolondo revival

Lake Toolondo in the Wimmera will receive a water allocation from Rocklands Reservoir. Recent rainfall has resulted in nearby Rocklands Reservoir exceeding 56 per cent capacity, a threshold to trigger a large-scale water allocation for Toolondo. This is expected to create a high-quality trout fishery at Toolondo for several years, enough time for stocked brown trout to grow with the right environmental conditions. Water levels in Lake Toolondo are reliant on water transfers from Rocklands, which have not occurred in recent years.

In early 2023, Toolondo received about 3,5000 rainbow trout. The trout are the first fish stocked into the Lake Toolondo since 2019, with plans for a further 14,000 brown trout and 10,000 rainbow trout to be stocked later this year - returning the lake to the top of many a trout fishers list of go-to destinations.

To assist in providing a productive environment for stocking, the VFA is reducing carp numbers in Lake Toolondo in conjunction with recreational fishers, GWM Water, the Wimmera Catchment Management Authority and commercial carp fisher, Keith Bell.

Last year more than 70 tonnes of carp were removed from Toolondo. A further 22 tonnes of carp have been removed from the lake in recent times with carp harvesting planned to continue through to December.





## Supporting hand for Thowgla Creek.

The banks of Thowgla Creek have received an environmental helping hand from the combined efforts of more than 30 volunteers over 3 days near Corryong. Over 5,000 new trees and shrubs now call the banks of Thowgla home.

The plantings will accelerate the recovery of the system following the devastating wildfires in 2019 by stabilising banks, providing shade and housing terrestrial food items that fish just love! The Australian Trout Foundation's 'Trees for Trout' program is leading this rehabilitation effort, supported by the Corryong Angling Club, the VFA, North East CMA, Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action, and the broader community.

The team reports their planting effort along Nariel Creek in 2021 is growing well and the creek's has also benefitted from the installation of instream habitat. Victoria's next generation of fishers also got involved along the Cobungra River with 10 school students from Swifts Creek Primary planting over 600 trees. An awesome effort by all involved.





## Women in Recreational Fishing and BOATING!

The number of women in recreational fishing has increased rapidly in the five years since the Victorian Government established an award-winning network for female fishers, which will now be expanded to include recreational boating. To celebrate this momentous milestone the WIRF program has expanded to include boating priorities as well, so is now called the Women in Recreational Fishing and Boating – WIRFAB network.

Since being established on International Women's Day in 2018 the network has grown rapidly to include more than 4,100 members from around Victoria, Australia and abroad. This includes 20 leaders promoting the network and advocating for women in fishing.

The network's success was recently recognised on the global stage at the 10th World Recreational Fishing Conference, scoring an award for excellence in promoting inclusive participation in recreational fishing.

The network includes beginners to experts and provides a welcoming place to share stories, experiences, and tips. This will now extend to recreational boating and will cover a range of topics from professional development opportunities to practical skills-based events such as trailer reversing clinics.

Other WIRFAB leaders also feature on fishing TV and radio shows or podcasts and several have joined advisory boards and committees including the Recreational Fishing Licence Trust Advisory Committee, which guides the investment of Victorian fishing licence fees.

The network offers opportunities to build connections in the industry through major events and through the development of the WIRFAB Locals program, which includes more than 300 women participating in regular skills-based sessions to build their fishing knowledge.

## Better Boating Victoria

Better Boating Victoria was launched in 2018 to deliver on the Government's commitment to make it safer, cheaper and easier for boaters and fishers to get out on the water. In recognition of the strong relationship between recreational boating and fishing, BBV became a division within the Victorian Fisheries Authority in February 2021 and operates under two mandates:

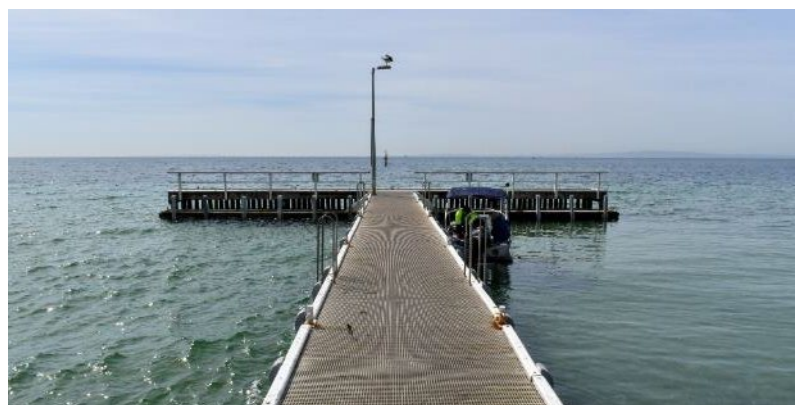


1. Delivery of the Government commitment to return every cent of licensing and registration fees to boating safety and facilities.
2. Delivery of the Victorian Recreational Boating Strategy 2022-23 Action plan, including:
  - Progressing and maturing the development of boat ramp upgrades for future construction.
  - Improving maintenance of facilities and supporting asset managers of public facilities.
  - Improving access on water through dredging and by improving all-abilities access.
  - Continued support for boating safety and marine search and rescue services.

The projects identified in the action plan which have been progressed to date include:

1. Development of the boating upgrade pipeline. Better Boating Victoria has commissioned concept designs and other reports to inform future improvement at Gunbower on the Murray, Port Fairy, Newhaven, Seymour, Stony Point, Shepparton, Mornington, Corinella, and Rye. Detailed designs and approvals are progressing at Tankerton, St Leonards, Werribee, Anthony's Nose, Lake Boga, Lake Glenmaggie, Lake Hume, Tullaroop, Howqua Inlet, and Melton Reservoir.
2. Construction at Limeburners, Avalon, Kirk Point, Cowes, Mahers Landing, Clifton Springs and Lake Burrumbeet.
3. A \$2 million grant program to support facility managers to maintain boating infrastructure and a \$1 million grant program to support dredging access
4. Improved boating destinations including upgrades at Cunninghame Arm and Raymond Island Jetty.
5. Continue to make it free for Victorians to launch and retrieve at public boat ramps across Victoria.

## VicFishKids and Fishing For All clinics

The ever-popular VicFishKids programs returned for another year. The program provides a wonderful opportunity and atmosphere for children to learn everything about fish and fishing from the experts. Events have already been held at Casey Fields (Cranbourne), Lake Fyans (Halls Gap), Lake Pertobe (Warnambool) and Lake Hyland (Churchill). Late this year, San Remo, Portalington and Williamstown events will close out the 2023 fishing year.

Lee Rayner, one of the VFA's Ambassadors, joined Fisheries Officers, VFA staff and the Education Team to chat with participants and share tips and tricks.

VicFishKids events are run with the help of local fishing clubs and Fishcare, ensuring participants learn from experienced fishers about tying knots, casting, bait selection and what to do when they land their first fish.

Catchable size rainbow trout from the VFA's Snobs Creek hatchery was stocked prior to these events to improve the chances of success. Children who pre-registered for clinics received a free fishing rod to take home.

There was also filleting and cooking demonstrations and tips on how and where to catch your target species.

In addition to the VicFish Kids program, the VFA have extended these amazing opportunities with the *Fishing For All clinic*. This program focusses on removing the various barriers that many fishers take for granted. The program aims to promote active involvement (inclusive) of women, people with disabilities, children, and CALD participants into the world of fishing.





## Fishing Festival returns to the Eildon (Goulburn) and Ballarat

These free festivals continue to grow bigger and better each year. It comes as part of the State Government's \$96 million Go Fishing Victoria plan to get more people fishing, more often.

Combined activities at these festivals included children's fishing clinics with experts, fly-fishing lessons, prizes and raffles, prize giveaways, lure painting and tours of the Victorian Fisheries Authority's Snobs Creek hatchery nearby – which grows trout and native fish for the statewide stocking program.

There were also trout stockings occurring at Eildon Pondage and Lake Wendouree on the day for people to try their luck casting a line.

A total of 10 stocking sites along the Goulburn River, between Eildon and Molesworth, shared in 1,500 stonker trout (large fish 2-4kg), with Eildon Pondage receiving 500. For participants at Lake Wendouree, kids assisted with the stocking of hundreds of rainbow trout. For fishers who missed out on these wonderfully large fish, the stonker trout stockings program will continue in 2023.



Victorian rivers and streams officially open to trout fishing on Saturday 2 September 2023. All lakes, including Lake Eildon and the Eildon Pondage, are open to trout fishing year-round.

## Golden Tag 150 milestone

The Golden Tag competition has reached a major milestone, hooking in 150 lucky winners right across the state. The competition commenced in February 2020 to encourage people to get out on the water and wet a line in their favourite spot, as well as boost recreational fishing tourism. The program has awarded more than \$400,000 in prizemoney.

Fishers have travelled all the way from the Lindsay River in the north-west to Nariel Creek in the north-east, Gippsland and right through to Lake Purrumbete in the south-west to land tagged fish worth \$2,000 and \$10,000.

The competition has been extended until the end of the year, with almost 900 Golden Tagged fish worth \$2,000 each still uncaught and swimming in waterways across the state.

Golden Tagged species include Murray cod, golden perch, brown and rainbow trout, Australian bass, bream, flathead, estuary perch, luderick, King George whiting, silver trevally, tailor, southern bluefin tuna and kingfish.

## School holiday trout stockings continue

Over 67,000 catchable fish were stocked into more than 80 lakes across the state just in time for school holidays. The school holiday stockings are part of the Victorian Fisheries Authority goal to stock 10 million fish this year and funded by recreational fishing licence fees and Go Fishing Victoria, the Victorian Government's \$96 million plan to get more people fishing, more often.

Family Fishing Lakes boast good access with waterside platforms, walking tracks, picnic areas and other facilities, creating a wonderful environment for people to breath in some fresh air and exercise whilst wetting a line.

On top of the lake stockings, the Eildon Pondage and Goulburn River between Eildon and Molesworth received 2,000 stonker rainbow trout weighing 4-5kg which are sure to test fishers if they're lucky enough to hook one.

Rainbow trout are perfect for kids or anyone new to fishing because they are easy to catch and take a range of bait such as worms and Powerbait, and lures as well. The catchable size rainbow trout for Family Fishing Lakes were grown by the Victorian Fisheries Authority team at their Snobs Creek hatchery, near Eildon.

### Portland

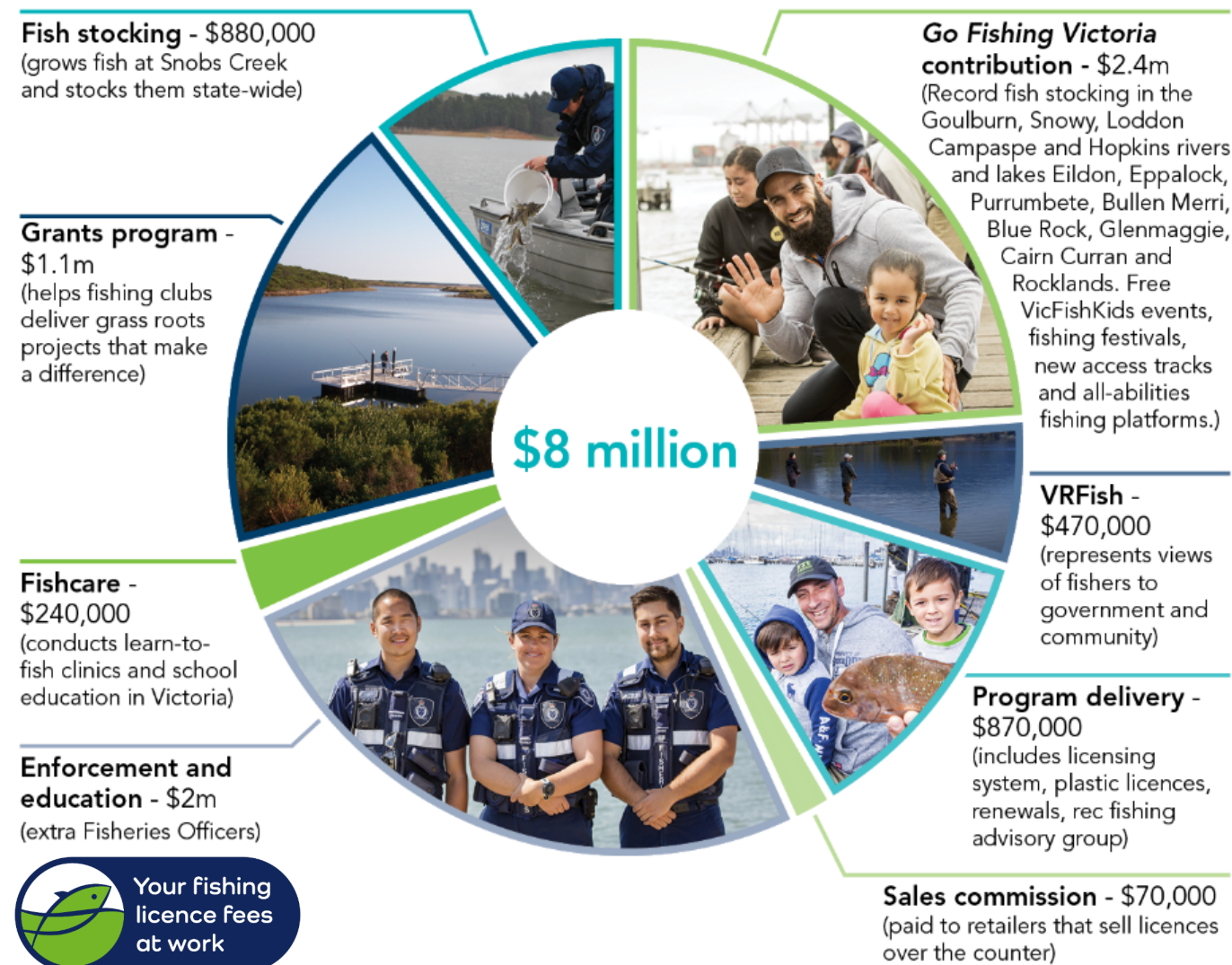

## Your licence fees at work to improve recreational fishing

Every year the revenue that is collected from the sale of Recreational Fishing Licences is paid into the Recreational Fishing Licence (RFL) Trust Account, and the funds are then used for projects and activities that improve recreational fishing in Victoria in many ways.



About \$8 million of fishing licence fees is reinvested each year into programs that improve fishing for all Victorians. From fish stocking to extra fisheries officers, programs to improve facilities and fish habitat and educating fishers through Fishcare, your licence fees are hard at work to safeguard Victoria's fisheries for the future.

### Fish stocking

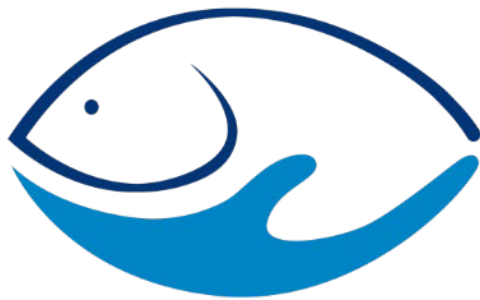
Your licence fees contribute significantly to the delivery of the recreational fisheries state-wide stocking program. They are used to operate the fish hatchery at Snobs Creek and Arcadia, meet costs associated with the delivery of fish across the state and for the purchase of additional fish from private hatcheries.

Recreational fishers across the state benefit from these stockings, which include huge numbers of Murray cod and golden perch released into iconic waters such as the Goulburn River, Lake Eildon, Lake Eppalock, Rocklands Reservoir, and brown trout and chinook salmon into the renowned crater lakes, Bullen Merri and Purrumbete.



## Fishcare

Fishcare Victoria is a community based not-for-profit organisation promoting responsible and sustainable fishing practices. Whether through their new 'Get Hooked On Fishing' app, through their extensive school education programs, or at a range of events held across the state, Fishcare provides valuable education to inspire the next generation of fishers.

## Recreational Fishing Grants Program

The Recreational Fishing Grants program allows a wide range of organisations and community groups to put licence fees to work on projects to improve fishing in their local area. Whether it's instream habitat, upgraded facilities, research projects or providing more fishing information, the grants program funds this vital work.

## Education and Enforcement

Fishing licence fees support the education of fishers and the enforcement of Fisheries Regulations through funding 13 extra Fisheries Officers to ensure everyone is doing the right thing. Fisheries Officers are based in locations across the state and make sure fishers are complying with regulations when wetting a line, whether chasing trout in a mountain stream or offshore targeting a monster tuna.

## Sales commission

A portion of your fishing licence fees goes back to businesses who sell fishing licences over the counter.





## Recreational Fishing Grants Program

Every year the Victorian Government provides revenue from the sale of recreational fishing licences to projects that improve recreational fishing, through the Recreational Fishing Licence (RFL) Trust Account.

Since its inception in 2001, the Recreational Fishing Grants Program (RFGP) has funded over 600 projects, worth more than \$23 million, to help improve recreational fishing and facilities throughout Victoria. The RFGP comprises three separate programs including:

- A [Small Grants Program](#) that is continually open to fund small projects (up to \$5,000 - GST Exclusive)
- An Intermediate Grants Program that is continually open to applications from angling clubs and associations and not-for-profit community groups (\$5,000 - \$50,000 GST Exclusive)
- A Large Grants Program (for projects from \$5,001 to \$100,000 - GST Exclusive)
- A Commissioning Program\* for large priority projects (generally in excess of \$100,000).

Note. Commissioning Program grants are to fund internal guided programs that benefit recreational users.

Each year funds from the Recreational Fishing Licence Trust Account are also disbursed to fund a number of projects. The following projects were approved from the 2022-23 round:

### Intermediate Grants

- Settlement Point Rock Platform: The Corinella Foreshore Committee of Management who will complete stairs to the popular rock platform at Settlement Point.
- Floating Poonton Ouyen Lake: Ouyen Anglers and Ouyen Incorporated to extend the floating pontoon jetty across Ouyen Lake, which will double as a fishing platform and walkway.
- Water Security Nhill Lake: The Nhill Lake Reserve Committee of Management to secure a year-round supply of water. The lake is stocked annually with catchable-size rainbow trout during September school holidays to provide family fun
- Lake Purrumbete Access Upgrade: The Lake Purrumbete Angling Club to formalise parking and install signage, fencing and an access gate off Purrumbete Pit Road. This project is to create a safe access point for land-based anglers, as well as an alternative to the main access point through the local caravan park on the opposite side of the lake.
- Ovens River Fish habitat improvement: The Alpine Fly Fishers secured funding to help install large boulders and logs in the Ovens River to improve in-water habitat for fish.

### Large Grants

- Porth Phillip Bay recreational reefs Ozfish Unlimited will undertake works to replenish recreational fishing reefs with the addition of recycled shell material at the three nearshore reefs (Altona, Frankston and Portarlington) and the three reefs approximately 2 kilometres out from Aspendale, Seaford and Frankston.
- Gunbower fishway upgrade: The North Central Catchment Management Authority will upgrade the fishway on the Gunbower Weir which will allow small-bodied fish, as well as juveniles of large bodied recreational fishing species will be able to safely move up and downstream of Gunbower Weir and colonise other parts of the creek.
- 'Cracking the Code' on the captive breeding of Macquarie perch: The Victorian Fisheries Authority will undertake research and development into the captive breeding of Macquarie perch will assist with the rebuilding of populations in the wild through stocking.
- Increase fish habitat and access at Kennington Reservoir: The City of Greater Bendigo will improve habitat by deepening pools and channels for fish movement, add woody structure and create access for non-powered vessels at this popular recreational fishery.
- Fish habitat forums Northern Victoria: Ozfish Unlimited will deliver a series of six highly engaging native fish habitat forums to educate and inspire local community members and organisations to participate in local restoration efforts, benefitting waterways throughout northern Victoria.

- Karkarook Lake infrastructure upgrades: Parks Victoria will upgrade the bore pump which maintains water levels in this popular recreational fishery and supports healthy fish habitat for stocked species such as rainbow trout and Murray cod.
- Multilingual recreational fishing campaigns in Melbourne: The 3ZZZ radio station will produce a multilingual educational campaign to improve the practices, procedures, and experiences of recreational fishers within multicultural communities
- Picnic Point, Cairn curran infrastructure upgrades: Goulburn Murray Water will install an all-abilities amenity facility at Picnic Point, which is a very popular access point for both land-based fishers and boats at this key recreational fishery.
- Murray crayfish populations assessment across north-eastern Victoria: The Arthur Rylah Institute will assess the status of 17 Murray crayfish populations in north-eastern Victoria and compare findings to benchmarking surveys completed in 2016 to guide the management of this popular recreational fishery.

# Appendix 1 – Proposed fish stockings

## Using the Tables

The following tables present a summary of three Vic Fish Stock consultation meetings held across regional Victoria in May 2023. They reflect the key outcomes from each meeting. Proposals for stockings were received prior to meetings. These proposals were discussed, and a final position determined by consensus. The proposals were then costed against budgets and fish production capabilities and modified to suit but maintaining the intention of the stocking. The outcomes represent the shared decision of the meeting attendees resulting from this assessment.

Annual stocking refers to the on-going stocking program where waters are stocked with the fish each year. These stockings will continue each year unless altered at the Vic Fish Stock meetings or there is insufficient water to stock fish, or some other unforeseen reason.

School holiday stockings refer to the stocking of ready to catch on-grown rainbow trout into small waters prior to selected school holidays.

The 2023 Vic Fish Stock meetings plan the stocking of both salmonids and native fish to align with the April 1<sup>st</sup> to March 31<sup>st</sup> reporting requirements.
