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Foreword

A report to each House of Parliament on the disbursement of Recreational Fishing Licence Revenue from the Recreational Fishing Licence Trust Account, 2021-22

Every year the Victorian Government provides revenue from the sale of recreational fishing licences to a range of programs and projects that make substantial improvements to recreational fishing in Victoria.

As the Chief Executive Officer, Victorian Fisheries Authority, I recognise the significant contribution that recreational fishing makes to the State's economy and the social wellbeing it brings to all those who participate in this popular activity.

I would like to thank the Recreational Fishing Licence Trust Advisory Committee, who have continued to provide valuable and timely advice on how RFL funds should be disbursed through the Recreational Fishing Grants Program.

The 2021-22 round of the Large Grants Program will see over \$916,883 allocated to 10 new projects. These projects include continuation of the Victorian Wild Trout Fisheries Management program, research into the residency and movement of yellowtail kingfish, a new floating fishing pontoon and walkway at Ouyen Lake, an upgrade of the Kalimna jetty at Metung, and habitat restoration in the Gippsland Lakes, Lake Eppalock, and several locations in the Tullaroop catchment to improve habitat for river blackfish.

A further \$396,450 was allocated via the Commissioning Grants Program; \$257,450 to produce a range of popular education and communication products that assist recreational anglers to understand and comply with fishing regulations, and \$139,000 for the monitoring of recreational fisheries at key locations in Port Phillip Bay, Western Port, the Gippsland Lakes, Corner Inlet and the coastal Lakes Entrance fishery.

In addition, two Intermediate Grant applications were also approved. The Association of Geelong and District Angling Clubs will receive \$51,865 for a project that will improve access for recreational fishers to the Painkalac Creek at Airey's Inlet, and the Alpine Fly Fishers will receive \$38,402 for habitat works to enhance the value of the Ovens River as a recreational fishery, in an area close to Bright.

The Small Grants Program saw over \$23,960 provided to angling clubs to run events and activities. This program has funded over 400 projects worth more than \$1 million since its inception in 2010.

During 2021-22, Recreational Fishing Licence Trust Account funds were also committed or disbursed to fund:

- increased fish stocking into hundreds of lakes and rivers, including iconic native species such as Murray cod, golden perch and Australian bass, and the highly sought brown trout, rainbow trout and chinook salmon.
- the deployment of Fisheries Officers to boost enforcement and education and protect our valuable fisheries;
- programs and projects to get more Victorians fishing, which has included even more fish stocking as well as the staging of the Hooked on Festival at Lakes Entrance and the VicFish Kids events at various locations.
- VRFish, to provide advice to the Victorian Government about the broad range of recreational fishers' views on the management of the State's fisheries resources;
- the Victorian Fishcare program, which delivers responsible fishing education and events to the community;
- · projects approved through previous rounds of the Recreational Fishing Grants Program; and
- the costs incurred in the administration of the Recreational Fishing Licence and Grants Program.

I'm sure that all recreational fishers would be very happy to know that their licence fees go towards increased fish stocking, better facilities, improved habitat, fisheries research, and more enforcement and education. It goes a long way towards keeping recreational fishing in Victoria in great shape and preserving it for future generations to enjoy.

I have pleasure in providing to each House of Parliament this report on the receipts and disbursements from the Recreational Fishing Licence Trust Account for 2021-22.

Fisheries Act 1995

Pursuant to Section 151B(4) of the *Fisheries Act 1995*, the Minister (responsible for Victoria's fisheries) must cause a report on how amounts paid into the Recreational Fishing Licence (RFL) Trust Account were disbursed:

- (a) to be prepared by 1 October each year; and
- (b) to be laid before each House of Parliament on or before the seventh sitting day of that House after the report has been prepared.

For the information of Honourable Members, the RFL Trust Account came into effect on 1 April 2001.

The role of the Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) is to administer the Recreational Fishing Licence Program and manage the amounts determined by the Minister for Fishing and Boating for the purpose of improving recreational fishing.

The VFA also administers the Recreational Fishing Grants Program and provides support to the Recreational Fishing Licence Trust Advisory Committee which provides advice to the Minister for Fishing and Boating on how funds from the sale of licences should be spent to improve recreational fishing in Victoria.

The 2021-22 financial year is the twenty first full year of the RFL Trust Account's operation.

The Victorian Auditor-General's Office has audited the receipts received, and disbursements made from the RFL Trust Account in 2021-22.

Enforcement & Education

In 2021-22, RFL Trust Account receipts contributed \$2,053,896 to the VFA's compliance budget.

RFL Trust Account receipts, when added to ongoing recurrent funding of fisheries compliance (education and enforcement) activities, contributes substantially to the delivery of recreational fisheries compliance services in Victorian coastal and inland locations.

Fisheries Officers have continued to have good contact with recreational fishers in the field during the last year. Table 1 summarises yearly totals for contacts in the recreational fishing sector. The work is divided into categories based on species, locations or other activities. Over 58,140 total contacts were made with recreational fishers by Fisheries Officers during the reporting period. Compliance contacts with Fisheries Officers totalled over 52,200, with Table 1 showing the number of offenders, verbal warnings, official warnings, infringement notices, and briefs of evidence for the year.

In addition, Fisheries officers conducted 5,897 Transport Safety Victoria inspections resulting in 1,207 offenders, 650 verbal warnings, 610 official warnings, 313 Infringement Notices and 2 briefs of evidence.

Fisheries Officers also attended 28 recreational fishing related shows, forums, clinics and events (including angling club meetings) for over 1,908 contacts

All Fisheries Officers provide services to the recreational fishing sector and interact with recreational fishers through:

- contact with recreational fishers in the field;
- attending angling club meetings;
- attending recreational fishing-related shows, family fishing events, forums and clinics;
- attending fish stocking events;
- liaising with grant recipients regarding the successful completion of infrastructure projects under the annual Recreational Fishing Grants Program (Large Grants);
- advising fisheries management on issues relating to recreational fishing;
- assisting Fisheries Management, Policy, Science and Licencing Branch on matters relating to recreational fishing;
- responding to recreational fishing issues raised from the 13FISH Offence Reporting Line;
- producing recreational fishing-related media releases/distributing booklets and pamphlets;
- investigating recreational fishing-related offences and prosecuting where necessary;
- collecting intelligence related to recreational fishing offences;
- participating in recreational fishing-related educational activities with school groups and the broader recreational fishing community; and
- engaging with culturally and linguistically diverse communities.

The VFA in conjunction with the recreational fishing community strives to achieve high levels of voluntary compliance amongst recreational fishers. By working collaboratively and by continuing to promote responsible and ethical fishing, we are better positioned to ensure both fish for now and fish for the future.

Fish Production and Stocking

In 2021-22, RFL Trust Account receipts contributed \$1,698,497 to the VFA's fish production and stocking budget. This includes \$977,081 of the base amount (approved by the Recreational Fishing Grants Working Group in May 2012, ongoing) to support fish production and stocking from Snobs Creek and Arcadia, and an additional \$721,416 from the Go Fishing Victoria initiative to boost fish stocking to over 10 million fish. Additional funding was provided by the State Government which contributed towards achieving this year's record fish stocking.

RFL Trust Account receipts, when added to state government funding of fish stocking and production activities, contributes significantly to the delivery of recreational fisheries state-wide stocking program.

The combined funds are used to operate the fish hatchery at Snobs Creek, meet costs associated with the delivery of fish across the state and for the purchase of additional fish.

In 2021-22 the VFA grew 1,351,600 native fish and 1,855,115 salmonid fish that were stocked into public waters. In addition to these fish the VFA purchased 7,007,433 mixed species of fish that were picked up and delivered to various locations across the state.

During 2021-22 VFA staff associated with the production and delivery of fish carried out activities such as:

- management of broodstock across all species;
- harvesting of eggs from all species;
- · feeding fish of all ages;
- · careful movement of fish as they develop;
- animal health monitoring and management; and
- our stocking vehicles travelled 232,372 km's which took 577 person days to undertake.

The VFA works closely with anglers and other key stakeholders to coordinate the successful breeding and delivery of fish across the state.

Go Fishing Victoria

In 2021-22, RFL Trust Account receipts contributed \$1,663,717 towards the VFA's implementation of the Go Fishing Victoria initiative to grow participation and provide more fishing opportunities.

RFL Trust Account receipts, when added to state government funding, contribute significantly to the delivery of the Go Fishing Victoria initiative. The State Government has extended its commitment to recreational fishers in Victoria, with Phase 2 of the Go Fishing Victoria initiative. The renewed plan invests over \$35 million to continue to grow participation and fishing opportunities around the state.

The RFL investment has contributed significantly to several aspects of the plan including improved access, fish stocking, events and engagement, the Go Fish Vic app, and the rock lobster tagging program. A summary of achievements in each of those areas is presented below.


Improved Access for Anglers

A total of \$135,025 has been spent on improving access in 2021-22. Projects included: resurfacing five high priority fishing and river access tracks on the Goulburn River, providing funding to the Dartmouth Progress Association to undertake maintenance of the Lake Banimboola fishing area, contributing funds to Gippsland Ports Committee of Management for the replacement of the existing McLoughlins Beach Jetty with a new DDA compliant jetty with public berthing facilities, and providing funds to the Goulburn Valley Association of Angling Clubs to hire an expert consultant to develop a fish habitat installation plan suitable for Waranga Basin.

Fish Stocking

In 2021-22 the VFA reached a major milestone with a record 10 million fish stocked into Victoria's lakes and rivers in the 2021/22 season. This is not just a state record, but a national fish stocking record as well.

This year over \$720,000 of Go Fishing Victoria RFL dollars purchased an additional 1.5 million fish that were stocked into Victorian waterways.



Events and Engagement

In 2021-22 it was great to see events returning to the main stage. Some of the highlights included the return of the annual Murray Codference which saw several hundred participants gain a deeper understanding of this iconic species and learn some new techniques whilst networking with other likeminded anglers. The VFA was also able to deliver the ongoing Vic Fish Kids Program at locations such as Nagambie, Williamstown, Bendigo, Karkarook and Seymour. Over 500 children were provided with the opportunity to go fishing and learn skills such as casting and how to rig their rod, and for many this was a new experience. We also saw the return of the popular 'Hooked On' events at Portland and Lakes Entrance, both attracting thousands of visitors and showcasing the fishing and tourism activities specific to those regions.

The VFA is continuing to endeavour to make fishing more inclusive to all. The Women in Recreational Fishing (WIRF) network continues to inspire and empower more females to give fishing a go. The network currently has over 3,800 members and the VFA was able to host the annual WIRF Leadership Program at Australian Fishing Trade Association Trade show in 2022 following postponement in 2020 and 2021. The VFA welcomed 7 new women to the leadership group. The Leadership Program offers WIRF leaders the opportunity to share their views and ideas with some of the fishing industries most influential leaders.

The Fishing for All program provides opportunities for people living with or affected by a disability and/or from marginalised communities to experience the benefits of fishing. Fishing for All events were staged in Shepparton and Williamstown and were well attended and enjoyed by all. Bachar Houli, one of our ambassadors joined the team at Williamstown and chatted with kids and parents about his passion for fishing and shared some of his fishing tips and tricks with them.

The VFA also provided recreational fishing forums around the State, including locations such as Boort, Ballarat, Nagambie, Albert Park, St Leonards, Torquay, Mitcham, Port Albert and Portland. These forums provide recreational fishers with the opportunity to discuss their ideas and ask questions while hearing from local Fisheries Officers, Better Boating Victoria and a range of fisheries management staff. Topics covered at these sessions included better fishing and boating access, boat ramp upgrades and new fish cleaning tables, fisheries science and research, enforcement, and education. The forums are a great way for the VFA to connect face to face with local clubs and discuss the many ways the VFA can help make fishing and boating better than ever.

The Go Fishing Victoria RFL investment towards this was \$393,398.

GoFishVic App

The GoFishVic App project is a new way of recording recreational fishing data that will allow fishery managers to make more informed decisions about fish stocks into the future, whilst giving recreational anglers a convenient way of logging their personal catches for their own reference.

To date the App has successfully engaged about 7,500 participants, this is an increase from 2,800 since the last update. The App has also successfully integrated with the Rock Lobster tag app, which occurred in September 2021. This merger will help reduce operational cost and ensure compliance for rock lobster fishers.

In future years, the rollout of the GoFishVic App will be centred on a concentrated effort to prioritise the App's data collection functionality to collect catch details from recreational fishers to then assist the VFA to make informed fishery management decisions.

Rock Lobster Tagging Program

The ongoing Recreational Rock Lobster Tagging Program entered its 5th season in November 2021 and has made a big step in transitioning away from plastic tags to go entirely digital. GoFishVic, a smartphone app from the Victorian Fisheries Authority, now allows fishers to allocate a digital tag for rock lobster catch, making reporting catches even easier for recreational fishers.

The transition to digital has removed the requirement for fishers to order, possess and affix plastic tags to rock lobster catch. It has successfully reduced the environmental footprint of the program and allows fishers to upload a photo of their catch via the app.

The VFA continues to monitor the success of the program and improve functionality of the GoFishVic app so that fishers can more easily record their fishing experience and improve their future success.

Data collected under the program improves the accuracy of annual stock assessments and is building our capacity to make robust fishery management decisions to maintain a healthy, sustainable, and well managed fishery into the future.

Notes to the Financial Report

These notes form part of and should be read in conjunction with the financial report of the Recreational Fishing Licence Trust Account.

Note 1 - Statement of Accounting Policies

Basis of preparation

This special purpose financial report has been prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Fisheries Act 1995.

The Recreational Fishing Licence Trust operates under section 151B of the *Fisheries Act 1995* to distribute revenue derived from the sale of Recreational Fishing Licences to projects that will further improve recreational fishing opportunities in Victoria, and to fund costs incurred in the administration of recreational fishing licences.

Funds received by the Trust include:

- all levies and fees in respect of recreational fishing licences;
- all income from the investment of funds within the Trust; and
- any other money authorised to be paid to the Trust by the Minister.

These are reported as receipts in the Financial Report.

Disbursements from the Trust include improvements to recreational fishing as determined and the costs incurred to administer the recreational fishing licences.

The report has been prepared on a cash basis to report on how levies and application fees received in respect of recreational fishing licences have been disbursed from the Trust Account.

Opinion
