Hi Joanne,

I support the increase of shark bodies from 2 to 5 per day. I own/operate EZ RL licence and would benefit greatly from the additional shark bodies during a time of increasing RL lease prices.

The benefit will also be recognised through the local community and tourists, seeking fresh local seafood, without friction with the rec fishers (due to the small quantity).

The extra pre landing call will total 3 separate contacts with VFA each time we come in (RL pre landing/small sale permit/gummy, school pre landing). Could the shark pre landing on the RL licence be recognised with the IVR call in and numbers noted on the Daily Catch Record? This would only be until VMS 30?) is implemented. This might help compliance efficiency, limit costs in setting up regulation for only 5 months and help fishers (especially single handed operations).

Thanks for your informative call just now. I note that comments from stakeholders have to be received by the 10th January, 2020, only four days away.

I think the proposal put forward by VFA involving a bi catch of 5 shark endorsement on my, and other southern rock lobster stakeholders entitlements to be a positive move and I will certainly be applying for an endorsement when they are issued.

Will VFA be charging a fee for these endorsements, and can the fishers use a line to catch the shark? Please take into consideration the fishermen bringing in their lobster catch already have a lengthy and involved reporting system to contend with before they arrive in port with their catch and therefore the catch of shark should be handled by the VFA representatives at docking time, rather than the fishermen having to report to the Commonwealth arm as well. This would become too difficult to handle given the time involved in reporting to two different fisheries.

I am in agreeance with the increased landing of gummy and school shark. However, instead of going from 2 bodies to 5 bodies I would like to see it increased to a 50kg trip limit with no reporting as trip limits work fine with other species such as flathead and whiting.

My reason not wanting a shark body limit is that I feel that it may lead to fishers possibly upgrading and/or targeting then retaining and landing the 5 largest sharks caught which are mainly large females which are often full of pups.

Hi Jo,

Thanks for the opportunity to provide comment on this.

Clearly, all eligible licence holders welcome this opportunity to increase the take of shark from 2 to 5 per trip and we thank the VFA for the efforts made to bring the implementation of this to fruition.

From a VRLA perspective, the only concerns that I have had raised relate to the pre reporting requirements, as follows;

- 1) If not using VMS it would be helpful that any pre-reporting requirement is integrated into the existing Lobster IVR reporting system (ie is not a completely separate system / process)
- 2) With regard to the timing for pre-reporting, it would make sense to align that with existing pre-reporting requirements where there are some exceptions in being able to prior only half an hour (rather than 2 hours) before entering port between certain hours (eg at Apollo Bay).

Dear Mr JO KLEMPF,

Thank you for a chance to  
comment on the Draft Fisheries Notice of 22/12/19.

The increase of shark numbers  
from 2 to 5 will have little or no effect on the existing  
40 tonne TAC. because of the relative small number of  
operators.

I am and have been in the Commonwealth  
shark fishery for over 40 years, myself and other fishers  
in the industry have constantly endeavored to have  
a sustainable fishery.

Some 30 years ago the Victorian fishers  
of the Commonwealth gill net fishery had favored a plan  
to help to protect the breeding stocks of gummy and  
school sharks along the entire coast line of Victoria,  
and three nautical miles to sea, this plan was enforced  
and fishing by all Commonwealth gill net fishing stopped.

This was a far better the main reason  
the fishery has remained relatively stable.

One of many concerns of future stock is the  
forgetting of larger frequent gummy & school shark  
within the three mile limit of the Victorian coast  
due to the ever increasing number of recreational fishers  
as there is no record of what is being taken by  
these fishers, unlike the Commonwealth fishers who must  
account for every fish and must release any school  
that is landed alive. It is extremely hard to accept  
the fact I am among many who are trying to help  
the fishery to remain sustainable by not fishing in  
breeding areas, while others are allowed to do the  
opposite, with virtually no monitoring.

We all know how pro-recreational the  
Victorian government is, even your government could

not argue that protecting breeding large fawn  
school & gummy stork must be the better for all,  
and don't forget that school stork are on the  
endangered list so any action to protect them stork  
must be applied.

May I suggest a museum size. Almost parallel  
school and gummy stork. be introduced. This would  
ensure any fawn stork be returned to the  
water and would stop targeting.
