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Introduction

Every year the Victorian Fisheries Authority, stocks many of Victoria's inland lakes, impoundments and rivers with key recreational angling species to improve fishing opportunities for fishers across the state. This document reports on the outcomes of the 2024 fish stocking consultation.

The fish stocking year reports on financial year, from 1st of July to 30th of June of the following year.

In 2024, the draft stocking plan was released for public comment for a period of six weeks.

Submissions to change the stocking program were received and considered from representative angler groups and recreational fishers. The Authority acknowledges and values the important contribution made by stakeholders in this process, particularly those who volunteered their time to prepare and discuss submissions.

The next round of Vic Fish Stock meetings will occur in early 2025.



2023-24 Fish stocking season—Summary

The 2023-24 Vic Fish Stock proposed that 1,319,390 salmonids and 8,971,000 native fish to be stocked across Victoria. A total of 2,013,592 salmonids and 9,539,100 natives were stocked between 1st July 2023 and 30th June 2024.

The 2022-23 and 2023-24 fish production years were impacted due to the statewide floods that occurred in the spring of 2022. This reduced the availability and condition of mature golden perch broodstock. Early predictions in the native season were of a golden perch shortage, therefore extra Murray cod and silver perch were grown and purchased.

As a follow up to the lower stocking season in 2022/23, the VFA were able to take the opportunity to stock an additional 1.5 million fish in 2023/24 with funds carried over from the previous season. This has allowed us to be close to our average of 10 million fish per year, with 29.5 million being stocked over the last 3 years.

An excellent year of brown trout production also resulted in an extra 400,000 fish being stocked as fingerlings.

2024-25 Vic Fish Stock meeting outcomes

The 2024-25 Vic Fish Stock meetings proposed native fish to be stocked into Victorian public waters in the summer of 2024-25 and salmonids stocked over winter 2025. Details of the planned species and numbers to be stocked for each water body are detailed in Appendix 1.

The proposed fish release figures summarised here and listed in Appendix 1 are targets for the 2024/25 financial year. Numbers may vary and may be exceeded or not attained, depending on a variety of factors at our hatcheries and waterways. The VFA will monitor fish availability and waterway conditions to get the best result possible. Therefore, fish allocations may be amended prior to release.



Fish Stocking in Victoria



Victorian Fisheries Authority Activity Spotlight

The Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) is always looking to provide or improve recreational angling opportunities across the state. Here is a glimpse of some of the VFA's activities pertaining to stocking and inland fisheries from last year.

11.5 million fish stocked last year in Victoria

The Victorian Fisheries Authority's fish stocking program has again hit a high-water mark with 11.5 million fish stocked last year, so more recreational fishers can wet a line close to home across the state.

More fish are stocked in Victoria than every other state and territory in Australia combined – with Murray cod, golden perch, brown and rainbow trout, threatened species Macquarie perch and trout cod, dusky flathead, Australian bass and more bolstering world-class fishing experiences that are easy and accessible for every Victorian to enjoy.

The Victorian Fisheries Authority has stocked more than 29.5 million fish since July 2021.

Last year, more than 1.8 million brown and rainbow trout were stocked in waterways across the state while 7.8 million native Murray cod and golden perch fingerlings are also now in waters for recreational fishers to enjoy. A total of 460,000 Australian bass and more than 700,000 silver perch were also stocked across the state.

The future of the endangered Macquarie perch continues to shine brighter with nearly 80,000 fingerlings stocked into Victorian waters to re-establish wild populations across the state, fast-tracking the recovery of the once-prominent native fish.

The recovery of Macquarie perch is also supported by significant upgrades at the VFA's Snobs Creek hatchery. Work on a new captive breeding centre has begun in 2024.



Boosting up the bass and estuary perch

Anglers across Victoria are benefitting from more than 715,000 Australian bass and estuary perch stocked into 32 lakes and rivers for recreational fishers to enjoy.


Australian bass and estuary perch live in coastal flowing catchments and are highly prized by recreational anglers as iconic native sportfish capable of living for over 40 years. Both species are stocked annually by the Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA), which has released around five million bass and perch over the last decade. Lots of these fish have reached catchable size and are now delivering outstanding fishing for Victorian anglers who, for bass, previously had to travel interstate for great lake fishing.

Waters that shared in the 460,000 bass stocking included Lake Glenmaggie, which now enjoys 50,000 newly stocked fish, while 52,000 fish were stocked at Blue Rock Lake. Traralgon Creek now enjoys 10,000 extra bass and rivers such as the Mitchell have been stocked with 100,000 fish for recreational fishers to enjoy.

The population of bass have been boosted in the Snowy, Cann, Timbarra, Macalister, Latrobe, Avon, Tambo and Thomson rivers. In Victoria's south-west, Bullen Merri and Elingamite lakes both now enjoy 10,000 bass each.

Anglers are also set to snag one of more than 260,000 estuary perch that have been stocked in waters across Victoria. Gippsland Lakes has been stocked with a super 98,000 perch, while Lake Tyers, Genoa River, Bemm, Snowy and Little rivers now all have 10,000 perch each.

Lakers Cutting near Point Lonsdale has been boosted by 15,000 estuary perch and fishers at the Barwon can catch one of the 45,000 stocked fish, while 20,000 perch are stocked at Werribee. Upper Stony Creek Reservoir has been stocked with 24,000 estuary perch and Devilbend Reservoir on the Mornington Peninsula, which now has 9,000 fingerlings.

Family fun on offer at Arcadia Visitor Centre

The new family friendly Visitor Centre at the Arcadia Native Fish Hatchery is set to become a tourism drawcard for the Goulburn Valley,

The Centre located at the Victorian Fisheries Authority's Arcadia hatchery located south of Shepparton on the banks of the Goulburn River. The new centre includes a public fish-out pond, playground and information to learn more about native fish, the history of fishing and Burnanga, the name for Murray cod in Yorta Yorta language.

Fishers of all skill levels can try their luck at the fish-out pond, which has been stocked with golden perch up to three kilograms, silver perch and Murray cod. During the school holidays it also receives on-grown rainbow trout to maintain a winter fishery. For primary school students that have recently received their free Little Angler Kit, it will be an ideal spot to test it out.

Free barbecue facilities provide a great day trip destination. For those camping nearby on the banks of the Goulburn River, the centre features free shower and toilet facilities.

The Arcadia hatchery was opened in 2021 and now plays a key role in Victoria aiming to maintain stocking of 10 million fish.

The Arcadia Native Fish Hatchery Visitors Centre is located at 200 Ross Road, Arcadia, about a 20-minute drive south of Shepparton.



New all year cod fisheries opened

A trio of central Victorian waters have been opened to Murray cod fishing all year-round.

Following widespread consultation, the three-month closed season has been removed on lakes Eppalock, Nillahcootie and Cairn Curran Reservoir.

These three lakes share in hundreds of thousands of cod stocked annually by the VFA and research has shown breeding among stocked populations in waters like this is low, so a closed season is of little benefit.

Removing the closed season in 2016 transformed Lake Eildon into a Murray cod mecca 12 months of the year. In 2021, a similar decision was supported for several western Victorian waters and this would provide great fishing opportunities and a tourism boost in the heart of the state.

Opening up year-round fishing also takes pressure off rivers like the Loddon, Campaspe and Broken to help support breeding populations.

The closed Murray cod season still applies in the majority of rivers and lakes north of the Great Dividing Range between 1 September and 30 November, to give Murray cod a chance to breed in peace - but it does not apply in Lake Eildon or waters of the Wimmera and Millicent basins, including Rocklands Reservoir.

Lake Eppalock is located 30 minutes from the booming regional city of Bendigo, with a growing population of more than 120,000 people. The lake has been stocked with more than 2.59 million cod since 2010.

Cairn Curran Reservoir is located about 45 minutes south-west of Bendigo, near Newstead and the historic town of Maldon, and is well regarded for its springtime golden perch fishing. To boost Murray cod fishing it has scored 250,000 fingerlings this season, among close to a million over the past 20 years.

The picturesque Lake Nillahcootie, on the Broken River south of Benalla, has scored more than 400,000 cod since 2011 and will continue to be a productive mixed fishery.



“Cracking the Code” on Macquarie perch

In 2023 the VFA began a three-year partnership worth \$3.7 million led by the Federal and Victorian governments to crack the code on how to reliably breed Macquarie perch in captivity. The three-year project will conduct dedicated research to ‘crack the code’ on captive breeding of the species, meaning fisheries experts will be able to produce and release Macquarie Perch using hatchery broodstock, rather than capturing wild adult fish every season.

The project, led by the Federal and Victorian Governments, features 12 partners across government, universities and community, including Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA), Fisheries Research and Development Corporation (FRDC), NSW Fisheries and the North East and Goulburn Broken Catchment Management Authorities.

This important work will also be driven by research partners including Deakin University, University of the Sunshine Coast, Monash University, Arthur Rylah Institute and the Norwegian Institute of Aquaculture Research, as well as the Goulburn Broken Catchment Management Authority.

Macquarie Perch were once abundant in south-eastern Australia but a range of factors, including barriers to fish migration and loss of habitat, have restricted populations to just a handful of locations. Breeding currently relies on annual collection of broodfish from the wild, with experts having been unable to replicate environmental conditions for broodstock to thrive in hatcheries over several breeding seasons.

This dedicated research project will examine nutrition, hormones, the timing of breeding and other factors to understand how to consistently produce fingerlings for stocking – boosting the ongoing work to save the Macquarie Perch from extinction. It will examine nutrition, hormones, the timing of breeding and more to understand how to consistently produce fingerlings for stocking.

Macquarie perch recovery is also being boosted by \$15m worth of development at the VFA’s Snobs Creek and Arcadia hatcheries. The ongoing work will see all Murray cod production move to Arcadia, freeing up capacity at Snobs Creek to maximise Macquarie perch breeding.

Since January 2020, the VFA’s Snobs Creek hatchery has produced more than 320,000 Macquarie perch that have been stocked into Victorian waters to establish populations both old and new.

Efforts to protect Macquarie perch have also been bolstered with the endangered species given full protected status. Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) have prohibited the take of Macquarie perch state-wide as part of an effort to give wild populations the best chance to be re-established. Fishing and Boating Forums

Recreational fishers and boaters from all corners of the state had the chance to discuss their much-loved pastimes and share ideas to make fishing even better at a series of free Fishing and Boating Forums. These forums, hosted by local fishing clubs, have become an annual tradition, with this year marking the third consecutive instalment. The forums featured a comprehensive hour-long presentation from Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) and Better Boating Victoria (BBV) staff on the latest in fishing and boating before the audience had a chance to engage with VFA and BBV representatives directly, providing an opportunity to ask questions and exchange ideas.

The 13 forums were held in person at Boort, Maryborough, Melton, Waverly, Dartmouth, Seaholme, Geelong, Horsham, Ouyen, Sale, Omeo and Inverloch, as well as online through a digital forum.

Topics were tailored to each region, including local initiatives from the Go Fishing and Boating Victoria plan, native fish recovery, fish stocking strategies, upgrades as part of the state's biggest ever boat ramp construction program being led by BBV, the vital work of Fisheries Officers and research insights from fisheries scientists into iconic fish like Murray cod and yellowtail kingfish.



Creating stronger local fishing clubs across Victoria

The Victorian Government is making sure more fishing clubs have the resources and facilities they need to grow their membership and promote fishing in their communities, with a new \$1.2 million grants program which is available to incorporated clubs across Victoria.

The first round of the Government's Stronger Fishing Clubs Grant Program has seen 32 clubs receive grants, funded by \$300,600 of funds raised from the sale of fishing licence fees.

The program supports clubs with grants of up to \$10,000, with the first recipients including Shepparton-based Burnanga Indigenous Fishing Club, Port Albert Fishing Club, Ballarat's Lakeside Anglers Club, Ocean Grove Angling Club and the 100-year-old Mitcham Angling Club.

The Burnanga Indigenous Fishing Club is one of the state's newest fishing clubs, and will use the grant to purchase IT, software and printing equipment to attract more anglers to the club and produce educational material on protecting and restoring native fish habitats.

The Lakeside Anglers Club will create new junior member start-up packs, purchase new uniforms and two laptops, hire equipment for public events and make enhancements to their website, complementing a range of broader changes within the club – boosting membership and promoting their activities to more local recreational fishers.

Celebrating their 100 years since formation, the Mitcham Angling Club will use their \$10,000 grant to boost technology upgrades at the club, while Port Albert Fishing Club will rebuild the popular clubroom kitchen.

Ocean Grove Angling Club will purchase new uniforms and promotional material to attract more members across the growing coastal community and buy new cooking equipment for club events.

Round 2 of the Stronger Fishing Clubs Grant Program will see another \$300,000 allocated to angling clubs and associations for projects like:

- fishing tuition for multicultural groups, women, first nations people and all-abilities
- open days at the club
- member training and events involving the public
- guest speaker nights
- upgrades of club IT
- club website development
- clubroom improvements

New habitat fund boosting Victoria's fish populations

Victorians can play a part in boosting fish populations across Victoria, through a new grant program to improve fish habitat in freshwater, marine and estuarine fisheries. The Victorian Fisheries Authority is rolling out the Fish Habitat Improvement Fund: with \$2.5 million in funding provided through the Victorian Government's Go Fishing Victoria plan, recreational fishers and partnering organisations are creating better fish habitat across Victoria's waterways.

The grants program includes two streams of funding: Stream one supports recreational fishing groups to apply for grants of up to \$50,000 to complete small-scale works such as planting native trees and shrubs, weed and erosion control, and fencing on public or private land. These grants will remain open until the funding amount is allocated.

Stream two enables larger-scale project partnerships to restore, recover and rebuild fish populations with up to \$200,000 available and co-investment from funding partners required.

As of August 2024, eight habitat restoration projects have been funded, 3 small-scale and 5 large-scale, totalling \$1.38 million of funding. This includes projects on estuary habitat improvement in the Gippsland Lakes, the installation of woody habitat in the Little Murray, and bank-stabilisation and in-stream habitat works in the Livingstone Creek to support the endangered Macquarie perch. Fish habitat Improvement Fund

What is the Fund?
In 2022, the Victorian Government committed to a \$2.5 million dollars Fish Habitat Improvement Fund to preserve and improve on Victoria's fantastic fisheries. This is a great opportunity for recreational fishers to work together, improve local fisheries and leave a wonderful legacy for the next generation.

There are two ways you can get involved.

Stream 1. Empowering recreational fishers to improve local fish habitat (community led projects up to \$50,000)
These projects will deliver small-scale works to improve local fish habitat works alongside waterways such as native vegetation planting, weed control, erosion control, fencing (to keep livestock out) on public or private land. This stream will help recreational fishers get involved, build capacity and establish partnerships with other fish habitat partners and land managers.



Stream 2. Partnerships to address critical fish habitat priorities: working together to restore, recover and rebuild fish populations (up to \$200,000 over 2 years).
This stream will deliver larger-scale projects involving multiple partners and strong co-investment to restore, recover fish habitat and contribute to rebuilding fish populations. Applicants for this stream will require strong project management capacity, leadership and connections with recreational fishers and other relevant stakeholders.

There are many opportunities across Victoria for improving fish habitat. Here are some examples of state-wide project priorities and opportunities that could be supported through this stream, however if your region has identified other key gaps in fish habitat then we would love to hear from you.

- Habitat Enhancement for threatened species (eg Macquarie Perch and Trout Cod)
- Re-snagging and other physical habitat enhancement in local waterways
- Upper catchment riparian restoration
- Port Philip Bay shellfish reef restoration
- Estuarine fish habitat enhancement
- Seagrass bed preservation, enhancement and recovery
- Removal of barriers critical to threatened fish migration
- Value adding other large scale fish habitat initiatives.
- Empowering recreational fishers and communities to have a lasting capacity in delivering for our fisheries.

Leaving a Habitat Legacy
Whether it's placing habitat, planting trees, keeping livestock out of rivers, removing blackberries or building artificial reefs, this program will create a lasting legacy for future generations of fishers in Victoria, in both the health of our waterways and our fisheries.

Waranga Basin gets habitat

Waranga Basin has had a habitat upgrade with the installation of around 80 habitat structures. The habitat structures consist of timber attached to concrete weights (~200kg each) and marked with navigation buoys. The timber was recycled (sourced) from nearby government funded road/rail projects.

The structures will be deployed on the eastern side of the basin.

Waranga Basin is popular with many on-water users and this investment will only help in raising the recreational value of this waterbody.

The work is a collaborative effort between BBV, Goulburn-Murray Water, Campaspe Shire, and the Goulburn Valley Association of Angling Clubs. Funding was sourced from the Recreational Fishing License Grant Program.

The VFA will assist in the overall project by stocking the system with 750,000 golden perch over the next three years.



Catfish on the Come Back!

Tandanus catfish are listed as a threatened native fish species and the VFA is committed to re-establishing more populations of the species and bringing them back in abundance.

For two years running, VFA has teamed up with five angling clubs from the Casterton Angling Society and the Glenelg Hopkins CMA to catch Tandanus catfish on the Glenelg River and release them multiple waters from north-west to north-east Victoria.

The initiative is a collaboration between 16 partners including recreational fishing clubs, Traditional Owner groups and fisheries and catchment management authorities to help recover catfish by re-establishing more populations of the species.

Recreational fishers from the Casterton Angling Society, including Casterton, Balmoral, Dartmoor and Merino Angling Clubs caught the catfish over the two-day event, supported by funding from the Murray-Darling Basin Authority - Native Fish Recovery Strategy.

Over 300 mature Tandanus catfish (most 40-55cm) have been caught by recreational anglers participating in the fishing competitions. Catfish are not endemic to the Glenelg River but given their strong numbers in the system and confirmed suitable genetics, they are serving as a useful surrogate population to help rebuild populations in their natural range within the Murray-Darling Basin.

The catfish have been transported by VFA staff north to the Murray-Darling Basin create new populations and boost existing populations including those impacted by the flooding, low dissolved oxygen water levels, and fish deaths in Spring 2022. Catfish have been released into the Little Murray River near Lake Boga, Campaspe River near Rochester, Broken Creek near Nathalia, Harcourt Park Reservoir in Bendigo, Lake Sambell in Beechworth and Mullinmur Lagoon in Wangaratta.

In addition to catfish, anglers removed hundreds of carp from the Glenelg River and caught and released large numbers of estuary perch, blackfish and tupong.

The catfish translocations contribute to the 10inTen initiative and the VFA's Conservation Hatchery which aims to restock and recover at least 10 threatened species in ten years.



Trout cod populations have been bolstered

Trout cod populations have been bolstered through the establishment of new populations by fish stocking and translocation.

Firstly, 44,900 trout cod fingerlings were stocked into four waters, including two first-time stockings to establish new populations in the Corryong-Jerimal Creek and the King River.

Secondly, mature trout cod have been captured from lakes Sambell and Kerferd near Beechworth and translocated to the Upper Goulburn River, upstream of Jamieson. Arthur Rylah Institute Scientists worked alongside VFA staff and intensively surveyed lakes Sambell and Kerferd to catch the trout cod using electrofishing, fyke netting and mesh netting methods. The trout cod were transported to the Upper Goulburn River where they were inserted with acoustic tags prior to release so their survival and movement can be monitored.

Trout cod were historically present in the Upper Goulburn River and the translocation to kickstart re-establishing the population will be complemented with the stocking of fingerling trout cod this summer. By re-establishing populations of trout cod, we move closer to downlisting the species and recovering them as a recreational fish species once more – the ultimate goal of the national trout cod recovery plan.



Women in Recreational Fishing and Boating

The Women in Recreational Fishing and Boating (WIRFAB) Network started with humble beginnings responding to a survey conducted in 2017 which identified a need for a supportive space for women to share knowledge, stories and skills about fishing.

Since being established as the Women in Recreational Fishing (WIRF) Network on International Women's Day in 2018, our community has grown rapidly. In March 2023, the network expanded to become the WIRFAB Network to acknowledge and support women in recreational boating. The network includes beginners to experts and provides a welcoming place to share stories, experiences, and tips.

The community is keen to grow their fishing knowledge through fishing clinics, boat handling/trailer reversing clinics, virtual information sessions, leadership programs, a conference and a dedicated website that is continually updated with resources. The WIRFAB Network will continue to empower and inspire more women to engage in these outdoor activities and pursue career pathways in the fishing and boating sectors.

WIRFAB Network achievements so far...

Over the first five years, the WIRFAB Network has grown and now includes:

- A dedicated online community – Facebook group (Women in Rec Fishing and Boating online community) and a website (wirfab.com.au)
- A broader social media presence, particularly on Facebook and Instagram, that provides information to everyone across Victoria and further afield.
- The community-based “WIRFAB Locals” program where people can meet up and go fishing together and that is currently active in 5 areas - Bass Coast/Gippsland, Metro, North East, Mornington and Geelong/Surf Coast/Bellarine.
- An annual “WIRFAB Leadership Program” that has resulted in 42 Victorian women taking up professional development opportunities and advancing their leadership skills, then going on to represent the VFA and WIRFAB at industry events and advocating for female fishers and boaters needs. Some participants have also gained careers in the industry, including representing women in popular fishing media and working in tackle stores.
- A variety of events held across Victoria each year to improve female inclusion and to provide a platform for female fishers and boaters to be heard.

Better Boating Victoria

Better Boating Victoria (BBV) was launched in 2018 to deliver on the Government's commitment to make it safer, cheaper, and easier for boaters and fishers to get out on the water.

Since becoming part of the Victorian Fisheries Authority in February 2021, BBV operates under two main mandates:

1. Reinvestment of Fees
 - All boating license and registration fees are reinvested into boating safety and facility improvements.
2. Delivery of the Victorian Recreational Boating Strategy 2021-30 and annual Action Plans, which include:
 - **Boat Ramp Upgrades:** Developing future boat ramp projects by commissioning concept designs and subsequent construction for locations like Tooradin, St Leonards, Schnapper Point, Howqua and Redcliffs.
 - **Facility Maintenance:** Enhancing maintenance and support for public boating facilities.
 - **Water Access:** Improving water access through dredging and ensuring facilities are accessible to all.
 - **Safety and Rescue:** Continuing support for boating safety and marine search and rescue operations.

Key Progress Highlights from last year:

- **Kirk Point**
Gone is the exposed old single-lane ramp at Kirk Point – now there's a double-lane concrete ramp with a jetty, breakwall and more parking.
- **Cowes**
The \$2.8m project to lengthen and raise the ramp and extend the jetty is finished and boaters can take advantage of the facility, with the longer jetty and ramp providing access to deeper water on either side of high tide. A Boating Vic camera is now live, so boaters can check the ramp and conditions before leaving home via the free Boating Vic app.
- **Limeburners Point**
A new parking area at Limeburners boat ramp in Geelong is open and has transformed the old overflow area. To boost capacity, the gravel overflow parking has been formalised and extended to include 56 more boat and trailer parks at the popular boat ramp.
- **Avalon**
The upgraded Avalon boat ramp is now open, providing improved access to Port Phillip and Corio Bay. Enhancements include the reconstruction and extension of 2 jetties, with added wave screens for better protection, and the redevelopment of an overflow parking area to add 25 new car and trailer spaces, increasing the total parking capacity to 36 spaces.


VicFishKids Events

The enormously popular 'VicFishKids' clinics have continued to introduce young anglers to the sport of fishing. Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) staff join volunteers from Fishcare Victoria and local angling clubs to lead the free clinics and teach kids the ins and outs of fishing. They'll learn how to cast, tie knots, rig up basic tackle and the steps to follow when they reel in a catch.

Hosted at local piers and jetties, the fishing clinic locations are perfect for beginners as they provide accessible and repeatable fishing opportunities, while giving kids the chance to catch a wide variety of popular species like snapper, flathead, garfish and calamari.

Free rods and reels are supplied at the fishing clinics to encourage kids to keep practicing at their local pier or jetty with family and friends.

Conservation Hatchery Open

The VFA's new Conservation Hatchery at Snobs Creek near Eildon, is purpose-built to breed, restock and recover threatened freshwater species in south-eastern Australia.

Equipped with state-of-the-art technology, the facility allows for monitoring and control of water and air temperature, light intensity and photoperiod, flow patterns, and automated feeding equipment. With such a diverse range of species requiring a wide range of environmental conditions our hatchery has been designed and built like no other. It gives us flexibility and precision required to care and breed this wide range of species. The facility boasts 4 isolated rack rooms, 4 recirculating aquaculture systems, live feed room and water quality and fish health laboratory.

Some of the species currently in the hatchery include multiple mountain Galaxias species (*Galaxias spp.*), Glenelg freshwater mussel (*Hyridella glenelgensis*), South-Gippsland spiny crayfish (*Euastacus neodiversus*), Freshwater blackfish species (*Gadopsis spp.*) and Southern purple spotted gudgeon (*Mogurnda adspersa*).

Funding to build Conservation Hatchery was provided by our project partners at the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA), Victorian Environmental Water Holder and the Commonwealth Government (DCCEEW).

As the only aquatic conservation hatchery of its kind in Australia, it provides our expert Snobs Creek hatchery staff, alongside research institutes, Traditional Owners, and industry partners, the means to improve the genetic diversity of species whose ranges have historically declined.

The hatchery, which opened its doors in May 2024, is a key component of the "10inTen plan", a collaboration with our research partners at the Arthur Rylah Institute (ARI, DEECA). 10inTen aims to reduce the risk of extinction for our threatened species, by establishing new populations of at least ten threatened species in as many years.





These breeding and re-introduction efforts strengthen populations for greater stability of target species in the face of climate change. The facility will also allow for ex-situ management of some of Australia's most threatened animals, further guarding against catastrophic events such as fire or flooding. They complement broader river and wetland rehabilitation initiatives, including revegetation and the securing of environmental water.

Some of the success stories from the hatchery so far include the breeding and release of over 2280 individuals since December last year

- 300 Murray spiny crayfish stocked between the Little Murray and Lower Goulburn
- 200 southern purple spotted gudgeon stocked across the Goulburn Broken and Wimmera CMA
- 1400 olive perchlet into Aquaculture facilities in Gippsland and Mildura
- 240 olive perchlet stocked across the North Central and Wimmera CMA
- 40 Southern Pygmy perch into the Goulburn Broken CMA

The Conservation Hatchery will facilitate the collection of data on species which have no prior history of captive breeding. Husbandry manuals are formed from this data and shared with other Government agencies, researchers or Traditional Owners looking to establish populations of these same species for conservation.

The Conservation Hatchery strengthens the position of the VFA's Snobs Creek hatchery site as a global leader in fish husbandry and conservation.

Fishing Festivals at Eildon (Goulburn) and Ballarat

These festivals are a celebration of fishing and offer something for every angler no-matter their experience level.

Ballarat

The Ballarat Festival offered free fishing clinics teach the next generation of anglers how to cast, bait up and net a fish, with bait and tackle provided and experienced instructors on hand from the Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) and Fishcare. Every pre-registered child was also gifted a free fishing rod.

Fly casting lessons from the Ballarat Fly Fishers, gave the more experienced fishers the opportunity to take their skills to the next level and they also taught how to tie fur and feather to imitate local insects and tempt trout.

Members of the Ballarat and District Angling Association displayed their boats and fishing gear and were joined by the Women in Recreational Fishing and Boating Network. Live trout from VFAs Snobs Creek hatchery were a highlight for kids, who helped stock hundreds of them into Lake Wendouree. Attendees were able to watch cooking demonstrations by chefs using Victorian-grown rainbow trout, now widely available at supermarkets.

There was also face painting, games and a fishing simulator for children, free tours of the Ballarat Fish Hatchery, and Waterwatch exploring the extraordinary world of aquatic bugs.

The Goulburn Festival held at Eildon Pondage celebrated the trout rivers opening and visitors had the chance to share in 2000 massive 'stonker' rainbow trout up to 5kg, that were stocked at numerous sites for trout opening. The Goulburn festival had market stalls, spinning prizes and live entertainers, plaster arts painting, games run by our education team and face painting, kids fishing classes with bait and tackle provided, tours of the Snobs Creek hatchery, the chance to help stock the pondage with trout, and there were fisheries officers on hand to answer any questions. A fireworks display over the pondage finished the day.

Snobs Creek Open Day

This annual event, normally held at the start of May, is an exclusive opportunity to tour the Snobs Creek hatchery, which is usually closed to the public.

The open day has dedicated experts on hand to guide visitor through this special place while answering any questions about the growing and stocking of trout and native fish species all across Victoria.

There are a range of activities for the whole family, including guided tours of the Snobs Creek hatchery, short films about the hatchery, kids educational activities, virtual reality fishing experience, experts on hand to answer your fishy questions, stocking truck display and giveaways.



Rocklands Metery Competition

To celebrate the success of the record-breaking fish stocking effort at Rocklands Reservoir, the VFA is offering a \$1000 tackle prize to the first person who catches a metre Murray cod there.

VFA have stocked over 2.7 million cod and nearly 1.5 million golden perch into Rocklands since 2017 and lots of those have grown up and are now getting caught.

The Rockland Metery Competition opened on 28 November 2023 and this competition will run until someone lands the metery! There is no closed season for Murray cod at Rocklands so cod fishing is allowed 12 months a year

The lucky angler who takes out the prize can spend their winnings at one of several Wimmera fishing tackle shops.

It is acknowledged that the winning cod is bigger than the slot limit of 55-75cm so it is important to read the terms and conditions about how we'd like anglers to measure the metery whilst Caring for Cod, taking photos and submitting their claim.

Hooked On' Events running strong



- Other features include: Boating Safety and Trailor Backing clinics run by Better Boating Victoria. A Kids zone offering fish themed activities, roving performers including VFA mascots, a range of pop up market stalls supporting local produce and other event attractions.



Your licence fees at work to improve recreational fishing

Every year the revenue that is collected from the sale of Recreational Fishing Licences is paid into the Recreational Fishing Licence (RFL) Trust Account, and the funds are then used for projects and activities that improve recreational fishing in Victoria in many ways.



About \$8 million of fishing licence fees is reinvested each year into programs that improve fishing for all Victorians. From fish stocking to extra fisheries officers, programs to improve facilities and fish habitat and educating fishers through Fishcare, your licence fees are hard at work to safeguard Victoria's fisheries for the future.

Fish stocking

Your licence fees contribute significantly to the delivery of the recreational fisheries state-wide stocking program. They are used to operate the fish hatchery at Snobs Creek and Arcadia, meet costs associated with the delivery of fish across the state and for the purchase of additional fish from private hatcheries.

Recreational fishers across the state benefit from these stockings, which include huge numbers of Murray cod and golden perch released into iconic waters such as the Goulburn River, Lake Eildon, Lake Eppalock, Rocklands Reservoir, and brown trout and chinook salmon into the renowned crater lakes, Bullen Merri and Purrumbete.



Fishcare

Fishcare Victoria is a community based not-for-profit organisation promoting responsible and sustainable fishing practices. Whether through their new 'Get Hooked On Fishing' app, through their extensive school education programs, or at a range of events held across the state, Fishcare provides valuable education to inspire the next generation of fishers.


Recreational fishing advocacy body VRFish is supported through your fishing licence fees and provides a strong voice supporting recreational fishers (www.vrfish.org.au)

Education and Enforcement

Fishing licence fees support the education of fishers and the enforcement of Fisheries Regulations through funding 13 extra Fisheries Officers to ensure everyone is doing the right thing. Fisheries Officers are based in locations across the state and make sure fishers are complying with regulations when wetting a line, whether chasing trout in a mountain stream or offshore targeting a monster tuna.

Sales commission

A portion of your fishing licence fees goes back to businesses who sell fishing licences over the counter.



Recreational Fishing Grants Program

Every year the Victorian Government provides revenue from the sale of recreational fishing licences to projects that improve recreational fishing, through the Recreational Fishing Licence (RFL) Trust Account

Since its inception in 2001, the Recreational Fishing Grants Program (RFGP) has funded over 600 projects, worth more than \$23 million, to help improve recreational fishing and facilities throughout Victoria. The RFGP comprises three separate programs including:

- A [Small Grants Program](#) that is continually open to fund small projects (up to \$5,000 - GST Exclusive)
- An [Intermediate Grants Program](#) that is continually open to applications from angling clubs and associations and not-for-profit community groups (\$5,000 - \$50,000 GST Exclusive)
- A [Large Grants Program](#) (for projects from \$5,001 to \$100,000 - GST Exclusive)
- A Commissioning Program* for large priority projects (generally in excess of \$100,000).

School holiday stockings refer to the stocking of ready to catch on-grown rainbow trout into small waters prior to selected school holidays.
