Introduction

Every year the Victorian Fisheries Authority, stocks many of Victoria's inland lakes, impoundments and rivers with key recreational angling species to improve fishing opportunities for fishers across the state. The annual rounds of Vic Fish Stock regional consultative meetings plan the direction of these stocked fisheries. This document reports on the outcomes of the 2021 consultative meetings.

The fish stocking year starts April 1st to March 31st the next year.

Vic Fish Stock meetings

The Vic Fish stock meetings consider recreational angling for each waterbody to:

- Determine the management objectives for the fishery
- Review the current fishery in light of the current year's stocking plan and identify any modifications required
- Draft the following year's stocking plan
- Identify other issues relevant to fish stocking
- Identify current fishery management issues
- Assess additional proposals to the stocking program

The Vic Fish Stock meetings provide a forum for discussions on fish stocking regimes and related recreational fisheries management issues.

In 2022, four meetings were held on-line in May following the draft stocking plan being released for public comment for a period of 3 months.

Submissions to change the stocking program are tabled from representative angler groups and from the VFA. This ensures that the submissions are supported by the relevant groups. Individuals who wish to submit changes are encouraged to contact the representation groups.

The meetings involve invited representatives from a range of stakeholder groups and include Victorian Fisheries Authority, the Victorian Recreational Fishing peak body (VRFish), Future Fish Foundation, Australian Trout Foundation (ATF), Native Fish Australia (NFA) and fishing association representatives.

The Authority acknowledges and values the important contribution made by stakeholders in this process, particularly those who volunteered their time to prepare for and attend these meetings.

2021-22 Fish stocking season—Summary

The 2021 Vic Fish Stock proposed 1,500,450 salmonids and 8,016,000 native fish. A total of 1,917,328 salmonids and 8,296,820 natives were stocked.

2022-23 Vic Fish Stock meeting outcomes

The 2022-23 Vic Fish Stock meetings proposed native fish to be stocked into Victorian public waters in the summer of 2022-2023 and salmonids stocked over winter 2021. Details of the planned species and numbers to be stocked for each water body are detailed in Appendix 1.

The proposed fish release figures summarised here and listed in Appendix 1 are targets only. Numbers may vary and may be exceeded, or not attained, depending on hatchery conditions, water conditions (e.g. water quality, water levels), infrastructure maintenance, decisions of waterway managers, security of fish supply (e.g. unforeseen impacts on production such as mortality, disease, quarantine status and availability of required stocks from private suppliers) and any unforeseen circumstances that could preclude planned fish releases. Fish allocations may, therefore, be amended prior to release.



Go Fishing Victoria

Phase 2:2018–2022

The state government has extended its commitment to recreational fishers in Victoria, building on its Go Fishing Victoria plan to get more people fishing, in more places, more often.

The renewed plan will invest over \$35 million to:

-  Scrap parking and launching fees at all Victorian public boat ramps
-  Stock Melbourne metro lakes with native Murray cod, golden perch and silver perch
-  Phase out commercial netting in the Gippsland Lakes through a compulsory buy out
-  Stock eastern king prawns into Lake Tyers
-  Deliver the Fishing for All initiative and continue the successful Vic Fish Kids Program
-  Build a new \$7 million native fish hatchery in northern Victoria
-  Increase stocking to 10 million fish by 2022
-  Develop a fishing tourism 'destination' plan to boost regional visitation and business opportunities
-  Invest \$600,000 in new fishing platforms and cleaning tables in Port Phillip Bay
-  Open inland reservoirs to kayaks, canoes and tinnies with electric motors
-  Mandate access to Crown land river frontage covered by grazing licences for recreational fishing and camping
-  Invest \$2.5 million in reef development in Port Phillip Bay to improve fish habitat

Recreational fishing is important to our social and economic wellbeing. It is one of our most treasured pastimes, contributing significantly to families and communities. By working with fishers, Go Fishing Victoria will deliver on its commitments to help get more families outdoors.

Victorian Fisheries Authority Activity Spotlight

The Victorian Fisheries Authority is always looking to provide or improve recreational angling opportunities across the state. Here is a glimpse of some of the VFA's activities pertaining to stocking and inland fisheries from last year.

Fish translocation operations for Greens Lake

Two translocation operations to rehome native fish from Greens Lake (near Corop) was performed in March and June 2022. The lake has recently been decommissioned and converted into a natural wetland.

The VFA were generously supported by our esteemed stakeholders from the Goulburn Valley Association of Angling Clubs, Rochester, Kyabram, Nathalia and Underra Angling clubs.

The massive effort translocated a total of 394 golden perch (largest 6.5kg) and 42 Muray cod (largest 1.2m) have been relocated to boost populations in Watanga Basin (goldens only), Goulburn River (near Murchison) and Arcadia fish hatchery. The operations also removed around 13 tonnes of carp that to be made into fertiliser.



Recovering river blackfish

River blackfish, one of our highly valued and priority native species of fish, received a boost to local populations with the release of 16 adult fish adjacent to Coorimungle Creek. The day was attended and celebrated by the local community, Corangamite CMA, researchers and the VFA – with many helping hands to assist in the safe release of the fish.

The fish were successfully bred in captivity and released by Native Fish Australia member Stephen Mueller, and we celebrate and congratulate him on his perseverance and passion for this achievement – one of the very few times captive bred blackfish have been released in Australian history.



Australian Trout Foundation – unlocking the secrets about temperature

The Wild Trout Fisheries Management Program continues on in 2022 thanks to the passionate work of the Australian Trout Foundation (ATF) and your recreational fishing licence fees.

A key project delivery component this year is the collection of water temperature information in priority trout streams to be made available to fishers so they can plan their trips with the best chance of success.

Water temperature is known to have a large impact on trout feeding and populations so revealing this information for key Victorian trout streams will provide unprecedented insight for trout fishers and for managing trout fisheries into the future.

Dr Brett Ingram (VFA) is working closely with DELWP and ATF to make these data available live online for trout fishers to easily access live.

Congratulations to Terry George, Paul Stolz and the ATF team on continuing to lift the bar on recreational fisher understanding and engagement in managing the Victorian wild trout fishery.

GoFish Vic App merger with RL Tag


GoFishVIC is a digital revolution for how recreational fishers record their fishing experience and improve their future fishing success. It's the easiest way to have your complete fishing history available at your fingertips and uncover the secrets to catching more fish. The information collected through the program is building our capacity to maintain a healthy fishery for recreational and commercial fishers, and absolutely vital to the long-term sustainability of stocks.

GoFishVic features terrific benefits for fishers including the ability to report catch of all species, add photos, share catch information via social media, view personal catch statistics and receive fishing news and updates.

On 15 September 2021, the FREE app underwent a significant merger with the RL Tag App to provide a singular powerful platform to enhance your fishing experience and complete your rock lobster reporting requirements. The merger also allows users to eliminate plastic waste from using traditional (physical) tags. The primary functionality and app navigation routes remain mostly the same. For rock lobster fishers and new users of the App, the VFA will implement a series of workshop and information updates (FAQs, dedicated webpage, instructional leaflets, videos) to help users transition to using GoFishVIC.

Golden tag competition extended in 2022

Anglers across the state now have another year to try their luck at catching a Golden Tag fish worth up to \$10,000, with the State Government announcing the competition is extended until 31 December 2022.

Launched in February 2020 to encourage visitation to Gippsland and the state's northeast following the season's devastating bushfires, the competition was later expanded statewide to support local businesses following pandemic restrictions.

More than 950 tagged fish are still uncaught, swimming in waterways right across the state, including at Lake Eildon, the Goulburn and Ovens rivers in the northeast, Lake Purrumbete in the south west and the Kings Billabong in the north west.

Tagged species include Murray cod, golden perch, rainbow and brown trout, southern bluefin tuna and yellowtail kingfish, flathead, bream, estuary perch, luderick, King George whiting, silver trevally, tailor and Australian bass.

The majority of fish are worth \$2,000; however, there are still a number of \$10,000 fish up for grabs¹.

The Golden Tag competition presents a great opportunity for locals to wet a line in their favourite spot close to home and encourage recreational fishing tourism, which has enormous economic benefits for communities.

Stonker rainbows released for regional and metropolitan family fun

Stocking the large trout is a way to promote interest in fishing and was undertaken to help out those who had been locked down and wanted to get outdoors for some much-welcomed outdoor recreation.

Seventeen metropolitan Family Fishing Lakes were stocked with up to 1000 'stonker' rainbow trout to bolster recreational fishing fun with some big catches. The trout weighed 4kg each and complement the large number of catchable size trout already stocked into Family Fishing Lakes.

Metropolitan Family Fishing Lakes boast good safe access with waterside platforms, walking tracks, picnic areas and other facilities, creating a wonderful environment for people to get some fresh air whilst wetting a line.

For the third year running, the Goulburn River system (Eildon pondage and Goulburn river between Molesworth and Eildon) also received about 2,000 stonker rainbow trout (for fishers who prefer to venture and try their luck around the northeast systems).

The program will once again return in September 2022 for both metropolitan and the Goulburn River systems.



Larger yearling trout stocking trial

The VFA have worked closely with VRFish, Ballarat District Angling Association, Australian Trout Foundation and prominent trout fishers and planned a larger trout stocking trial in four waters across Victoria.

Lake Wendouree, Lake Fyans, Moorabool Reservoir and Tullaroop Reservoir will all be stocked with 50g or larger yearling brown and rainbow trout (see table below).

Over the next 3-4 years, anglers will record their catch and effort and this citizen science monitoring information of catch per unit effort, size of caught fish and condition of caught fish will be used to evaluate the effectiveness of stocking larger yearling trout compared with regular yearling trout.


More habitat for freshwater fisheries

Over the past 6 months, the VFA have helped repurpose record amounts of tree debris (large logs and root balls) from storm damage, into valuable in-stream habitat for Murray cod, golden perch and a range of other species.

An amazing 1194 root balls/stumps (188 truckloads) have been installed across 13 locations in Victoria. Key fisheries receiving woody habitat included the Goulburn River, Barwon River, Lake Eppalock, Lake Boga, Merrigum Lake (Burnanga Indigenous Fishing Club), Arcadia Native Fish Hatchery Visitor Pond and Rainbow Lake.

In October 2021, the VFA formed a working group with our contacts across six Catchment Management Authorities (CMA's), OzFish Unlimited, VRFish, DELWP and private contractors, to connect with Bushfire Recovery Victoria and best utilise available root balls and logs following storm damage.

A big thanks go to Bushfire Recovery Victoria for supplying and delivering the timber. This is a great example of working in partnership across Government, bringing together fish and land management, to build better recreational fisheries and improve river health in Victoria.



Record Macquarie perch stockings and grants to help species recovery

Macquarie perch populations across Victoria's northeast benefited from a Commonwealth Government grant from Landcare (Bushfire Recovery Grants Program) to help recover the iconic species through breeding and habitat improvements. This will complement the record stocking of fingerlings, more than 145,000 fingerlings into six waterways across the North East region of this state.

Macquarie perch are an endangered species where stocking and targeted recovery programs provide critical pathways to accelerate their recovery in the wild. Populations of Macquarie perch have also been heavily impacted by bushfires which have caused the loss of habitat and increased sediment in waterways.

Stockings were complemented by instream fish habitat (boulder seeding, timber habitat), and riverbank improvement works by locals, the Victorian Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning, Landcare Network (Ovens and Upper Murray), North East Catchment Management Authority, recreational anglers, recreational angling groups (Corryong Angling Club) community volunteers, Women's in Recreational Fishing Network and Traditional Owners.

The generous Landcare grant of \$181,500 would be used for a range of recovery measures across the Buffalo and King rivers and Cudgewa Creek. The grant also meant staff at the VFA's Snobs Creek hatchery near Eildon could spend more time breeding these valuable fish and increasing the number of fingerlings produced for stocking.

This season's Macquarie perch stocking program culminated in the community coming together to assist with the stocking of Macquarie perch fingerlings into the following systems:

- Ovens River, below Wangaratta - 40,000
- Goulburn River, near Trawool - 58,000
- King River - 15,000
- Buffalo River, upstream of Nug Nug - 15,000
- Cudgewa Creek - 15,000
- Lake Dartmouth - 2,200

More tiger trout for Purrumbete

Lake Purrumbete's reputation as a trophy trout fishery got even better with the addition of 7,000 tiger trout (brook male x brown trout female).

The stocking of tiger trout into Lake Purrumbete over the last three years has been incredibly successful with freshwater fishers catching trout up to 2.3kg in size. Fishers have revelled in their sportfishing qualities and as a table fish for the family too.

The stocking trial at Lake Purrumbete began with a request from VRFish that has seen more than 1,200 tiger trout and 7,400 cheetah trout released to date.

Lake Purrumbete is stocked annually with Chinook salmon, brown, rainbow and brook trout, a species mix supported by the Lake Purrumbete Angling Club. The lake is also home to a self-sustaining population of redfin which often school in great numbers and can be caught by fishers of all skill levels.

Lake Purrumbete will also benefit from the Government's Boating Safety and Facilities Program grants program that awarded \$312,000 to the Lake Purrumbete Foreshore Committee of Management to renew the jetties and pontoons at the popular boating destination.

The grants program is part of the Government's \$47.2 million investment to improve recreational boating in Victoria, which includes Better Boating Victoria making it free to park and launch at Victorian boat ramps and establishing the Better Boating Fund.



Murray cod – Giants on the move

Victorian recreational fishers can look forward to again casting a line for Murray cod anywhere in the state. The Murray cod season opened on Wednesday, 1 December, following a three-month closure in most waters to enhance breeding opportunities for this iconic species.

Victoria boasts several of Australia's premier Murray cod fisheries thanks to sensible catch limits, record stockings and substantial improvements to fish habitat and river health. One of the best Murray cod fisheries in Victoria is Lake Eildon, which has been stocked with nearly three million cod fingerlings over the last 30 years, primarily funded by recreational fishing licence fees. Freshwater fishers are now regularly catching trophy metre-long cod with a lucky few encountering giants up to 120cm.

In more good news for Murray cod fishers, Lake Eildon has welcomed an exciting new two-year research project this summer to unlock some of the mysteries about cod movement into the Goulburn River above the lake. The study will determine if cod in the upper Goulburn River are an active part of the Lake Eildon population or a distinct one of their own. 20 Murray cod over the minimum size of 55cm will be tagged with acoustic transmitters that emit a regular 'ping' as the fish swims.

Listening stations in the Goulburn Arm of the lake and up the Goulburn River will detect these 'pings', recording individual fish movement, depth and speed every time a tagged cod comes within range of a station. The project is supported by keen cod fishers by helping to monitor tagged cod movement, ensuring strong engagement with those most passionate about wetting a line for the species. This two-year project is a terrific example of applied research to improve knowledge for recreational fishers and fisheries managers, all of whom want to see Lake Eildon's cod fishery go from strength to strength in the years ahead. Australian bass stocking

Recreational fishers will be excited to hear 150,000 Australian bass fingerlings were stocked into nine Victorian waters to further improve freshwater fishing opportunities.

Victorian Fisheries Authority CEO Travis Dowling said the bass stocked this week all went into Gippsland lakes and rivers with another 292,000 to come for 11 other waterways across the state.

This enormous bass stocking effort of 442,000 fingerlings this season is part of a dedicated effort to stock a record 10 million fish by April 2022, funded by fishing licence fees and the State Government's \$35 million Go Fishing Victoria plan to get more people fishing.

Australian bass are an iconic sportfish that can grow to 50 centimetres in favorable conditions.

Blue Rock Lake is an excellent example of how successful our bass stockings have been. In conjunction with on-water access improvements for small boats and kayaks, lure and bait fishers are regularly catching bass in good numbers, including in dedicated bass fishing competitions that are becoming more common.

Outside of Gippsland, Ferntree Gully Quarry in Melbourne received 1,000 bass and Lake Bullen Merri near Camperdown, which already boasts bass to 2kg and more, was stocked with 10,000 fingerlings.

Other Victorian waters that received bass stockings include:

- Mitchell River - 100,000
- Blue Rock Lake - 50,000
- Glenmaggie Lake - 50,000
- Snowy River - 50,000
- Cann River - 30,000
- Latrobe River - 20,000
- Macalister River - 23,000
- Timbarra River 20,000



Record estuary perch stockings

A record number of more than 410,000 estuary perch have been stocked into seven waterways across Victoria.

Estuary perch are a popular target for fishers and one of a dozen species stocked annually to further improve fishing opportunities in the state's lakes, rivers and estuaries.

The Maribyrnong River has since welcomed a further 120,000 estuary perch that found new homes amongst 32 fish habitat structures installed in November 2021.

For the first time ever, Aura Vale Lake near Emerald has also been stocked with 5,000 estuary perch.

Further east – the Gippsland Lakes has been stocked for the second year in a row with 140,000 fingerlings.

The stocking at Gippsland Lakes comes as part of the Gippsland Lakes Recreational Fishery Plan, which is returning the waterway to a recreational fishing mecca, following the end of commercial net fishing in 2020.

Overall this season, estuary perch has been stocked into:

- Maribyrnong River - 120,000
- Gippsland Lakes - 140,000
- Barwon River - 113,700
- Lake Tyers - 25,000
- Aura Vale Lake - 5,000
- Bemm River - 5,000
- Snowy River - 5,000



Record one million fish stocking for Lake Eppalock

Recreational anglers will have close to a million chances to reel in a fish at Lake Eppalock with a record stocking for the waterway.

Set to improve freshwater fishing for decades to come, the one million fish stocking is part of an Andrews Labor Government promise to stock an Australian-record 10 million fish across the state by April 2022. It is also a key component of its \$35 million Go Fishing Victoria plan to get more people fishing more often.

The Lake Eppalock was stocked with ~600,000 Murray cod and ~360,000 golden perch fingerlings, set to grow to catchable size within three to four years.

A short drive from Bendigo, the lake is known for producing exceptional freshwater fishing, including golden perch and redfin. At the same time, more Murray cod are stocked every year as part of an increased focus on the iconic native species by the VFA.

Many of the stocked Murray cod are grown by the VFA at its Snobs Creek hatchery, made possible by the Government's reinvestment of recreational fishing licence fees.



Maribyrnong River Native Fish Revival project – COMPLETED

Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) in a partnership with recreational fishers (RFL Grant), DELWP, Melbourne Water, Parks Victoria and local councils have completed the three-year (\$815,000) multi-tiered Maribyrnong River Native Fish Revival Project.

The project was finalised in November 2021 with the installation of 32 new native fish habitat from Avondale Heights to the Flemington Racecourse. Structures made from repurposed felled timber and concrete were built with the help of prisoners at Hopkins Correctional Centre, in addition to hundreds of tonnes of rock donated by the Cherry Creek Youth Justice Centre Project for use on the habitats.

The habitats will be home to some of the 300,000 estuary perch already stocked in the Maribyrnong River since 2018. Other key deliverables of the project include baseline fish population and fish habitat surveys, a new boat launching facility, estuary perch stocking, a recreational users survey, a review of existing angling access/infrastructure and an historical review of Maribyrnong River.


Waranga Basin Fish Habitat Program

Leveraging off the success of the Maribyrnong Native Fish Revival Program, the installation of fish habitat into Waranga Basin is getting closer thanks to the big steps taken by Roland Huber and the Goulburn Valley Association of Angling Clubs (GVAAC) successful Recreational Fishing Large Grant.

To progress the installation of fish habitat, a project steering committee has been formed (Jan 2022), a stakeholder engagement session held (Feb 2022) and the next deliverable will be the habitat installation plan (June 2022) - outlining the strategies for determining final habitat design, obtaining habitat supplies and determining a suitably qualified contractor to safely install the habitat (July 2022).

The habitat installation plan is expected to recommend (1) installation of purpose-built habitat comprising of a natural timber-concrete beam complex to safely manage risk (boating and navigation) and manufactured within budget constraints and (2) a multi-year approach for habitat installation to fully optimise the recreational fishing growth opportunities for this waterbody (see proposed map below).

The fishery enhancement project is complemented by the updated boat ramp for Waranga Basin at Harriman Point, delivered by Better Boating Victoria.



Arcadia native fish farm – the last big step.

Now that earthworks are done and, we have a successful first harvest season under our belt, all efforts are now focussed on the last piece of the jigsaw puzzle - construction and fit out of our native fish hatchery building at Arcadia. The hatchery building will measure 48 metres x 16 metres and once operational, will enable us to close the production cycle at Arcadia. This means, over the next few years, Arcadia will become self-sufficient, bringing broodfish into condition, breeding from them and, rearing larvae through to fingerling stage all on site.

To make sure the hatchery can be fully utilised and ready for spring, we have stocked our brood ponds with more than 150 thumping Murray cod and golden perch. To make them feel at home and, to build their condition, we've been feeding them on a rich diet of carp fillets and yabbies. There was quite a commotion when the first batch of 250 kilograms of yabbies were released into the broodstock ponds.

All broodfish going to Arcadia are first put through fish health screening and treatment as part of a quarantine process. This also involves sexing, pit tagging, salt bathing and fin clipping broodfish for DNA analysis. It's important we keep fish health in top condition and ensure we maximise the genetic diversity of all broodfish used for breeding.

Despite frustrating rain delays, we expect to complete the hatchery concrete slab by the end of next week and, by mid-July the hatchery shed will be erected. Soon after this, the internal walls and ceilings will be installed followed by electrical works and heating cooling systems. Around this time more than 70 specialised tanks, pumps filtration equipment will be installed by our highly skilled crew at Arcadia.

The hatchery shed will be operational by September, in readiness to receive the first batch of Murray cod eggs laid down at Arcadia in October. It usually takes up to two seasons for Murray cod to settle in and reliably breed in ponds so, we will continue to receive larvae from Snobs Creek hatchery to ensure we maximise the use of plankton ponds this season.

Last season we harvested 480,000 fish from the ponds. We have set ourselves an ambitious production target of reaching 1 million native fish at Arcadia this season. For progress updates please visit <https://vfa.vic.gov.au/recreational-fishing/go-fishing-victoria/new-native-fish-hatchery>



New partnership to train fish farmers of the future

The Victorian Government has formed a partnership with GOTAFE to train the fish farmers of the future. Together with the Government, GOTAFE has created a new, free Certificate Level 3 agriculture course to develop fish farming skills

The 12-month course started on July 16 2021, with a two-day introductory session enabling prospective students gain an insight into the course.

The course focuses on practical skills including fish feeding, breeding and harvesting, and releasing fish into the wild. A range of units will be taught on site at the new Arcadia Native Fish Hatchery near Shepparton and the Snobs Creek Hatchery near Eildon.

The Victorian Government is encouraging indigenous students to participate in the course and begin the journey to working at Arcadia. Two graduates of the course will be offered at least 12 months employment at Arcadia.

Once complete, the Arcadia Hatchery will produce 1.6 million native fish each year and support up to 20 jobs on and off site. The Government has committed \$3 million to develop a visitor centre at Arcadia in addition to the \$7 million to build the fish hatchery.

Melbourne to host World Recreational Fishing Conference 2023

The Victorian Government has secured the hosting rights for the 10th World Recreational Fishing Conference in 2023. Melbourne will host the event from February 18-23, 2023 at the Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre while also being broadcast digitally around the world.

The WRFC is the world's most prominent gathering of the recreational fishing community and is held every three years in major cities around the world for researchers, recreational fishers, angling organisations and government to meet and exchange knowledge about hot topics in recreational fishing.

The four-day event is expected to attract hundreds of international visitors from at least 20 countries, as well as recreational fishers and fishing experts from across Australia. The conference will include exhibitions and also combine the Talk Wild Trout Conference and Murray Codference with the world-class event. Some exciting keynote speakers have been approached which we will announce as soon as we can.

The Government's bid was led by the Victorian Fisheries Authority in partnership with recreational fishing organisations including VRFish, FutureFish Foundation, Women in Recreational Fishing Network, Australian Recreational Fishing Foundation, Fisheries Research and Develop Corporation, the Melbourne Convention Bureau, Visit Victoria and leading recreational fisheries scientists in Australia.

The Fisheries Research and Development Corporation has been named as a major partner of the event.

Past WRFC conferences have been held in Canada, Brazil, Germany, USA, Norway, Australia (Darwin), Canada and Ireland. The website will be updated regularly with event information and will be supported by a strong social media campaign.



First-class facilities complete at Lake Purrumbete

The Andrews Labor Government has partnered with locals to improve fish cleaning facilities at one of Victoria's premier trout fishing destinations, Lake Purrumbete, providing an \$18,000 grant for a range of now-completed improvements.

Awarded to the Lake Purrumbete Foreshore Committee of Management, Minister for Fishing and Boating Melissa Horne said the grant has assisted in repairing the lake's facilities following a severe weather event in 2019.

Completed works include a covered shade structure and three new large fish cleaning tables featuring overhead running water, plumbing, and lighting to enhance anglers' fishing experience.

Stocked by the Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) with Chinook salmon and rainbow, brown, tiger and cheetah trout species, and with an abundance of redfin, there are also plans for future improvements at the shelter.

These plans include electric barbecues, tables, and chairs, to ensure families can conveniently catch, clean, cook and eat their fish caught at Lake Purrumbete.

Complementing the new facilities is a \$312,000 grant awarded to the committee earlier this year through Better Boating Victoria's Boating Safety and Facilities Program to renew jetties and pontoons at the lake.



School holiday trout stockings continue

Families across Victoria were able to catch an exciting new hobby over the school holidays thanks to the stocking of almost 8,000 catchable size rainbow trout into 16 lakes across the region.

Over 32,000 catchable fish were stocked into more than 80 lakes across the state just in time for school holidays in 2021. The school holiday stockings are part of the Victorian Fisheries Authority goal to stock 10 million fish this year and funded by recreational fishing licence fees and Go Fishing Victoria, the Victorian Government's \$35 million plan to get more people fishing, more often.

Family Fishing Lakes boast good access with waterside platforms, walking tracks, picnic areas and other facilities, creating a wonderful environment for people to breath in some fresh air and exercise whilst wetting a line.

On top of the lake stockings, the Eildon Pondage and Goulburn River between Eildon and Molesworth received 2,000 stonker rainbow trout weighing 4-5 kg which are sure to test fishers if they're lucky enough to hook one.

Rainbow trout are perfect for kids or anyone new to fishing because they are easy to catch and take a range of bait such as worms and Powerbait, and lures too. The catchable size rainbow trout for Family Fishing Lakes were grown by the Victorian Fisheries Authority team at their Snobs Creek hatchery, near Eildon.

Your fees at work to improve recreational fishing

The State Government is giving Victorian anglers more opportunities to wet a line thanks to new projects funded through the *Recreational Fishing Grants Program* – now in its twentieth year.

Worth more than \$925,000 in reinvested fees, the grants program is putting fishing licence fees to work to ensure every Victorian angler has access to the state's best fishing experiences – with the 11 new projects ranging from fish habitat improvements to a jetty upgrade, education, and fisheries monitoring right across Victoria.

In the Gippsland Lakes, 50 fish habitat structures will be placed at the mouth of the Mitchell River to provide more shelter and food for iconic species like black bream, estuary perch and Australian bass – contributing to the East Gippsland Catchment Management Authority's plan to improve habitats in rivers that enter Jones and Tambo bays.

At Waranga Basin outside Shepparton, the *Goulburn Valley Association of Angling Clubs* received a grant to install a woody habitat, creating more homes for golden perch. The basin will also be stocked by the Victorian Fisheries Authority, commencing this summer with 100,000 fingerlings – meaning more stock for anglers to reel in.

In south-west Victoria on the Glenelg River at Pritchards Landing, a longer floating pontoon will replace the jetty to provide all-abilities access at any water level and temporary tie-up for three boats next to the ramp.

Keen anglers on the Little Murray River will also receive a boost, with five sites between Swan Hill and Fish Point Weir to welcome more snags in deep pools for Murray cod and golden perch. The North Central Catchment Management Authority also has similar plans for more instream habitat into Pyramid Creek.

The *Australian Trout Foundation* has received funding to continue delivering its Wild Trout Fisheries Management Program – including collecting stream temperature data, site selection for bankside tree planting, assessment of incubator stocking trials as a recovery tool, and the annual Trout Conference.

Trout and native anglers on the Goulburn River will benefit from three grants awarded to the *Goulburn Broken Catchment Management Authority* to enhance fish habitat near Eildon, Trawool and downstream at Wyuna, installing lunkers and more than 110 logs and stumps.

Finally, the VFA will receive a grant to monitor catches in Port Phillip, Western Port, Corner Inlet, and the Gippsland Lakes, along with funds to publish the *2022 Recreational Fishing Guide* in English, Chinese and Vietnamese, fish length rulers, and measures for rock lobsters, abalone, and spiny crayfish.

Recreational Fishing Grants Program

Every year the Victorian Government provides revenue from the sale of recreational fishing licences to projects that improve recreational fishing, through the Recreational Fishing Licence (RFL) Trust Account.

Since its inception in 2001, the Recreational Fishing Grants Program (RFGP) has funded over 600 projects, worth more than \$21 million, to help improve recreational fishing and facilities throughout Victoria. An annual Large Grants Program (for projects from \$5,001 to \$100,000) is open for applications between 1 October and 28 February. A Small Grants program is open year-round and provides funding of up to \$5,000 for fishing clubs and other organisations to run community fishing events and undertake small scale projects.

Each year funds from the Recreational Fishing Licence Trust Account are also disbursed to fund a number of projects. Successful application this year are:

- Gippsland Lakes Habitat Restoration project: The East Gippsland Catchment Management Authority will install woody habitat in the Gippsland Lakes which will benefit key species such as black bream, estuary perch and Australian bass.
- Waranga Basin native fish habitat project: The Goulburn Valley Association of Angling Clubs will lead a project to create additional habitat in Waranga Basin for native fish species such as golden perch.
- Upgrade of the jetty at Pritchards Landing on the Glenelg River: The Glenelg Hopkins Catchment Management Authority will replace the existing small, fixed jetty with a larger pontoon-based jetty, which will improve access for recreational fishers.
- Victorian Wild Trout Fisheries Management Program: The Australian Trout Foundation will implement a range of programs and research and educational activities to safeguard the future of Victorian wild trout fisheries.
- Increase fish habitat in the Little Murray River: The North Central Catchment Management Authority will install additional woody habitat and snag structures to improve the recreational fishery for native fish in the Little Murray River.
- Increase fish habitat in the Pyramid Creek: The North Central Catchment Management Authority will install additional woody habitat and snag structures to improve the recreational fishery for native fish in the Pyramid Creek.
- Enhance fish habitat in the Goulburn River at Eildon Waters: The Goulburn Broken Central Catchment Management Authority will install woody structure to improve fish habitat in the Goulburn River near Eildon.
- Increase fish habitat in the Goulburn River at Wyuna: The Goulburn Broken Central Catchment Management Authority will install additional woody structure to improve fish habitat in the Goulburn River near Wyuna.
- Increase fish habitat in the Goulburn River at Trawool: The Goulburn Broken Central Catchment Management Authority will install additional woody structure to improve fish habitat in the Goulburn River near Trawool.

Appendix 1 – Proposed fish stockings

Using the Tables

The following tables present a summary of three Vic Fish Stock consultation meetings held across regional Victoria in May 2022. They reflect the key outcomes from each meeting. Proposals for stockings were received prior to meetings. These proposals were discussed, and a final position determined by consensus. The proposals were then costed against budgets and fish production capabilities and modified to suit but maintaining the intention of the stocking. The outcomes represent the shared decision of the meeting attendees resulting from this assessment.

Annual stocking refers to the on-going stocking program where waters are stocked with the fish each year. These stockings will continue each year unless altered at the Vic Fish Stock meetings or there is insufficient water to stock fish, or some other unforeseen (production issues) reason.

School holiday stockings refer to the stocking of ready to catch on-grown rainbow trout into small waters prior to selected school holidays.

The 2022 Vic Fish Stock meetings plan the stocking of both salmonids and native fish to align with the April 1st to March 31st reporting requirements.
